Chairman's Message Bill Lawens, Chairman - Board of Supervisors

As the Board of Supervisors begins the Fiscal Year '13 budget process we are extremely gratified to know that our levee was approved by FEMA and Spring Lake will not be in a high risk flood zone, thus saving our residents thousands of dollars a year. Additionally, there will be no repairs or construction needed on the levee, just the continuance of our maintenance program. I want to give a big thank you to our Manager, Joe DeCerbo, who worked tirelessly to

obtain the levee accreditation from FEMA.

I would like to thank Supervisor Tim McKenna for his leadership with the renovation of the community center, and Supervisor Leon Van and resident Larry Miesner for their work with Personnel. Supervisor Brian Acker continues to work with staff on the Charter, finances and the budget process, and Supervisor Gary Behrendt is working with staff and legal counsel with the continuing land acquisition program.

Other articles in this issue of The Breeze highlight the signing of our Charter by the Governor so mosquito spraying can be conducted again; and the canal maintenance that has begun. Work by our own personnel, using leased equipment, is saving thousands of dollars by not having to contract the work out.

As our Drainage staff has begun working on canal maintenance projects, the Board anticipates the official start of our Updated Water Control Plan projects during the next fiscal year. With the help of our Engineer, SFWMD, and USDA, we should be well on our way to positively positioning this community in regards to water retention, storage, and quality for the future. This current Board and Manager want to ensure that future leaders of our District will not have to go thru the time consuming tasks of addressing and fixing old problems, and put into place a drainage system and organizational development process that will last for generations to come.

Many of our friends and neighbors are headed back north for the summer, and on behalf of our Board of Supervisors and Staff we wish you safe travels and see you next season!

Fema Approves Levee!!! ———

After nearly four years of intensive and detailed work with FEMA, the Spring Lake levee has been approved and will NOT be shown on the new flood maps as an at risk structure, thus saving homeowners over a million dollars collectively. Additionally, the District does NOT have to spend any additional funds for repairs, which would have been paid via taxes.

BACKGROUND:

Within Highlands County and within the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) Spring Lake has one of the few levees. When the area was first mapped for flood insurance purposes in 1983-it was determined that the levee provided protection from at least the 1% annual chance of flood. As a result, the areas south and west of the levee were shown to be of moderate risk (Zone B).

During the scoping phase for the remapping of Highlands County, this levee was identified as having to be analyzed to see if it still provided the same minimum protection from the 1% annual chance of flood. It was on July 2, 2008 that FEMA Engineers first met with the District Manger to inform him of the

newly approved Levee Certification Process and the impact it had on the new flood maps. Along with FEMA, staff from SFWMD and the engineering consultants from PBS&J were in attendance. The Manager was notified that without levee certification the new flood maps would remove the District from Zone B and put it in a High Risk Flood Zone. The result to affected homeowners who have financed their properties would be flood insurance that could cost over \$4,000 per year! Additionally, PBS&J projected that studies and construction on the levee could run as high as a million dollars. To make matters even worse, this was an unfunded mandate; meaning we are required to do it but there is no money to help us.

After this meeting to determine our options it was evident that we could not just ignore the mandate but would have to work with FEMA as much as we could. On February 6, 2009 FEMA agreed to provide the District a 12 month correction period to address maintenance only deficiencies. During that period FEMA would continue its mapping study of the area as if the levee did not provide the minimum protection.

From 2009 thru 2010 the District conducted numerous tasks and submitted an application for what is known as a PAL; Provisionally Accepted Levee. It gave the

District two years, until February 6, 2012, to submit documentation that the levee provides the necessary flood protection. During this same time period meetings were held with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in Jacksonville and Tampa; PBS&J engineers in Orlando and Tampa; SFWMD; our own District Engineers; and FEMA. A meeting held in Atlanta, Georgia with FEMA Regional Director Mark Vieira gave the District much needed hope that we would not have to complete all of the extremely expensive tests and construction on the existing levee.

On December 1, 2011 the final report was sent to FEMA. After a few requests for additional information we were optimistic that the levee would be accepted and the flood maps would remain the same. A public meeting was scheduled to be held at the Agri-Center on March 22 and a morning meeting that day was coordinated by FEMA for all governmental staffs. It was at that meeting that Mr. Vieira showed the new flood maps to the District Manager and there were NO CHANGES! The Provisional designation had been removed from the maps and Spring Lake remained in the moderate risk level.

After the staff meeting Mr. Vieira, toured the levee and pump station and complimented our staff on the work that had been done on the levee, and the cleanliness and organization of our pump station.

This has been a very long and arduous task over the past four years, but our success has saved Spring Lake residents a tremendous amount of money.

Canal Maintenance Begins

In preparation for the Water Control Plan and the various projects that will be associated with bringing Spring Lake into compliance with South Florida Water Management District, we have begun to do general maintenance on selected canals and water bodies.



Financial Goals include:

- The District will have a budget reflective of a sound staffing pattern, a progressive salary administration program, and organizational goals and objectives to determine expenditures.
- The District will maintain adequate reserves to protect it against unforeseen circumstances and situations.
- The District will have sound financial management and reporting including investments, controls, adequate insurance coverage, and utilization of appropriate external counsel and assistance as needed.
- The District will have a budget process that involves the Board, management staff, working groups, and public input.
- The District will develop a budget process timetable and chart of work for each fiscal year

Community Center Update

Over the past several months renovations have been underway at the Community Center. New lights have been installed; new windows; ceiling repairs; interior paint; restroom repairs; kitchen area re-organized; and new tile to replace the old carpeting. The outside will be receiving a face lift as well. These renovation costs have been substantially reduced as a result of the skills and talents that some of our staff members have, most notably: Travis Turner; Josh and Travis Nolen; and Brian Patrick. The work has been overseen by Assistant District Manager Clay Shrum and Board Supervisor Tim McKenna.

The Board continued to discuss the future usage guidelines for renting the Community Center and at its April 11 Board meeting passed a motion to establish new deposit fees effective May 1, 2012. Groups less than 25 will provide a \$50 deposit; larger groups \$100. New guidelines and rental agreements will be available when you come to the District Office to make your reservation request.

These are much needed improvements and should give our community a respectable place to meet and get together for a number of years. Along with the renovations the District has installed new locks; you must come to the District Office to secure keys and sign for the usage.

Governor Signs Charter

On Friday, April 6, Governor Scott signed into law Bill 1495 that revised the Spring Lake Improvement District Charter, including the reinstatement of mosquito spraying. According to the Bill, Section 3 states:

Referendum- By July 1, 2012, the Spring Lake Improvement District shall conduct a referendum of landowners voting on a one-acre one-vote basis on the question of granting the Spring Lake Improvement District the power to provide mosquito control services. The referendum question shall be posed as follows:

Shall the Spring Lake Improvement District be authorized to provide mosquito control services?

According to Section 4 of the Bill, if this referendum fails to receive approval from a majority of landowners voting on a one-acre one-vote basis, this act shall stand repealed on December 31, 2012.
