op the North shore of Lake Istokpoga and Northwest of Sebring Airport, was purchased about a decade ago and has lain idle since that time. There are several miles of waterfront.

A total of 3,215 acres was purchased in the name of Coral Ridge Properties, Inc. It is on the Highlands County tax rolls at a value of \$289,890, agricultural zoning, and pays yearly taxes of \$4,226.20.

The Highlands General Corporation has 2,148 acres, on the rolls for \$113,930, and pays taxes of \$1,668.23. Part of this land is in the Marion Hendry bay area and has been the scene of persistent muck fires. It is impassable and swampy in part of that area, with few roads allowing access.

Sales began coming through that week in the office of Circuit Court Clerk Earl Rich. Asked if out-of-the-country people were buying these lots, a spokesman said "no", that many of their buyers were in the

# Spring Lake Preview Set For Weekend

Although homes now under construction in Spring Lake, the big new Westinghouse subdivision near Sebring, is not yet completed. Public demand has led to a preview showing of nine exhibit homes now under construction.

Spokesmen for Spring Lake, a subdivision of Coral Ridge Properties, Inc., said a sales representative will be on the premises Saturday and Sunday.

The subdivision is located off Highway 98 at Lake Istokpoga. Most of the homes are being built by Broward County builders who have built in Coral Springs, another Westinghouse property. The only local builder is Rice Construction Co.

The subdivision covers 5,363 acres of land six miles Southeast of Sebring. Lots have been selling briskly, with warranty deeds in the Circuit Court Clerk's office reflecting sales ranging from \$2,646 to \$3,700 per lot.

### Commission OK's Design for New Agriculture-Civic Center

A county building program to cost in the neighborhood of \$300,000 was approved at the Highlands County commission meeting on Tuesday.

Design for the new agriculture-civic center was accepted and architect Jim Heim instructed to proceed with preparation of specifications.

Heim estimated construction costs would be near \$250,000 for the center to be built, on US 27 just North of the 27-State 66-US 98 intersection, South of Sebring.

The approved design calls for a building containing 13,551 square feet. It includes an auditorium 89 by 60 feet. Its seating capacity will be 800 to 1,000 persons.

The smaller projects approved Tuesday were for the Voting and Comunity Building at Venus and the voting machine warehouse.

The Venus building bids are

to be opened on June 14. Cost on this building has been estimated at \$30,000. It will be a 34 by 74 foot structure, and is to be located on Clubhouse Rd. on State Road 731.

The voting machine warehouse had been authorized at earlier commission meetings, but at meeting this week the board set Monday, May 17, for opening bids. This metal building will cost between \$13,000 and \$18,000, the commissioners estimate.

The building program will be financed from the construction trust fund set up when bonds, backed by state race track taxes, were sold.

Other buildings which have been mentioned as possible projects to be financed from this fund are an addition to the county jail, addition to the courthouse annex, county office building in the Avon Park area and new headquarters for the county road and bridge department.

None of these projects were discussed at this week's meeting.

# Spring Lake has new street of model homes under way

### County defers action

Highlands County real estate evelopers voiced, strong rotest Tuesday morning to the roposed new subdivision egulations being prepared by he Board of County Comnissioners.

Developers were particularly pset at requirements on onding and construction acounts receivable, and the roposal regarding county naintenance of roads in sub-ivisions.

Following 45 minutes of ometimes heated testimony, ommissioners agreed to delay ction on the proposals until the lighlands County Land Developers Assn. could present etailed recommendations on the matter.

Association members were iven until Oct. 10 to submit heir own proposals to the board nd County Engineer Gordon lays.

Protesting portions of the egulations were Mickey Miller, resident of the association and hairman of Leisure Lakes; ack Ryan of Coral Ridge 'roperties; Alvin Robins, resident of Land Services, nc.; Frank English, president f Placid Lakes Realty, and J.C. mith, a private citizen.

of the committee, which had met at least 14 times since February to prepare the regulations, was competent to make technical decisions affecting developments.

-Set a public hearing Sept. 19 for the closing of Highlands Terrace in Lake Sebring Estates;


-Approved a list of poll workers for the Sept. 12 primary election as prepared by Supervisor of Elections Jimmy Whitehouse;

-Approved a deputy sheriff's bond for Wesley H. Daum, Jr.

"We anticipate another 40 will be built by the end of this year," said Spring Lake resident manager Ireland Sanders. "The present models will be sold for occupancy after the new models are built."

Forty real estate brokers and sales people were told of the development's progress at a luncheon held Thursday, hosted by Spring Lake, in Holiday motel restaurant.

There now are nine models and three builders in Spring Lake, which is being developed by Coral Ridge properties, a subsidiary of Westinghouse.

The Marlowe and B and M. of Ft. Lauderdale and Rice Construction Co. of Sebring.

More builders will be brought in, Sanders said.

Realtors attending the meeting were given a schedule of price raises, showing the prices on the homes rising at a rate of \$500 per month. Sanders explained that this was in the cost of the land. Lots at first were sold at incentive prices, but by October "will be the full plat price." They now are \$4,000.

Home prices now range from \$18,000 to \$26,500 complete, with land and ready to move into.

Construction has begun on a central water system, Sanders said, and it should be completed in 90 days. However, there will be no central sewer system until 51 percent of the lots have been built upon.

"We now are bringing more builders into the area", said Sanders "and shortly we will go into Village No. 2 in 1973. We are having preliminary plans drawn for street lights. We plan to open a convenience store, a laundromat and a barber or beauty shop and a new sales office.

"We are working on some recreation. We have just dug Spring Lake. There will be a park. We are working on some recreation on Arbuckle.

Sanders said they anticipate putting 25 homes in Village No. 2 "to get it on its way. We are opening an office in Miami because that is the largest market and a large percentage of people coming here are from the east coast."

Hays spoke County engineer and road subulvision regulations which a local committee of 14 persons has worked on weekly from February through May.

Hays said 40 subdivision plats were put on the record last year in Highlands county but "This year it slowed down considerably."

Hays said the 64 pages of new regulations was compiled after "we felt present regulations needed upgrading."

Roads in subdivisions have been a problem, Hays said and "we do not want a situation of a subdivider putting in inadequate roads, then disappearing after all the lots have been sold and having the people who bought expect the county to keep them up."

Hays defined a subdivision as an acre divided into three or more lots. He said preliminary plats now are required for all subdivisions which are almost as extensive as the final plats.

Previously developers were allowed to build the kind of roads they wanted, but this has not worked out satisfactorily in most cases.

In subdivided areas which have no roads, Hays said that if a home were built at the end of a street, the county "probably would negotiate concerning it. It would be smart to give an individual a lot at the end of a street, if the person would build on it and "we would have to open the street. Our board would need to have assurance there would be building."

He said the board would "take such proposals one by one, no set policy." The Sebring News, Sebring, Fla. May 11, 1972 - 6A

## Spring Lakes superintendent explains referendum issue

Werner Buntemeyer, superintendent of the proposed 30 million bond referendum or the Spring Lake Improvement District, which will be voted on by residents in the listrict Dec. 28, has given the News the following explanation of the issue.

"First of all, and very important," Buntemeyer said, 'IT IS NOT A BOND ISSUE. It is a referendum which would authorize issuance of bonds over a period of many years up to the amount of \$30 million. The first amount could probably be about \$2.5 million."

Buntemeyer said he thought t only natural for there to be oncern and that clarification ertainly was called for.

The district's supervisors, cenneth Grady, Chuck Watson and Julian O'Neil, are local ausinessmen who understand and would not authorize ssuance of \$30 million worth of bonds," he said. "They know hat this must be drawn on a phase basis, a step at a time, and only when the community needs and can use the facilities or water, sewer and irainage."

Reason for the referendum, 3untemeyer said, is to avoid at 3pring Lake the problems many communities all over the United States are having because people who planned those communities years ago were not farsighted enough to arrange for long term, tax-free bond financing such as the Spring Lake Improvement District plans.

This type of financing, Buntemeyer explained, benefits the consumer because he can borrow money at bably two per cent under

arket rates.

"Another safeguard," he pointed out, "is that even the first \$2.5 million cannot be issued without a complete, professional engineering

feasibility study to prove that the system can be selfsupporting."

Still another safeguard is very obvious, he said. The bonds will have to be sold to investor bankers.

One of the bankers presently involved is Goldman, Sachs & Co. of New York.

"Goldman, Sachs is one of the largest and most reputable banking firms in the United States," Buntemeyer noted. "It is the banker for the United States federal government. It is the banker for the State of Florida. It definitely would not lend any money unless it knew the program was being staged on a practical basis and would be self-supporting by the people using the system."

Also, because Spring Lake is a small community with no credit rating, it could never borrow money without additional guarantees.

"The guarantees at Spring Lake are coming from Coral Ridge Properties, Inc., and Westinghouse Electric Corpiration," he said. "This means that, in the event of any deficit, Coral Ridge and Westinghouse would be responsible

for the payment of the deficity amounts until the system has a sufficient number of users and becomes self-supporting."

Buntemeyer said that this is the "most logical" method for giving the early citizens of Spring Lake a well-engineered, well-built sewer and water system and treatment facilities.

In many instances in the past in other developments, he said, such facilities have been poorly engineered and jerrybuilt and have had to be later bought by the citizens of the county at the expense of all the taxpayers.

The method being used at Spring Lake applies only to the people to whom the benefits accrue and does not burden the rest of the county, he said.

"This method is now being studied by the state and by other communities as an innovative technique for providing such vital facilities as sewer and water and good land planning, and protection of the environment," he said.

Buntemeyer emphasized that such a utility system "would not be owned by any developer."

# County commissioners hold off on manpower group decision for week

Polk County representatives invited Highlands commissioners Tuesday to join them in setting-up a five county manpower planning group to replace a state organization that now does the same job.

Highlands commissioners are thinking it over.

George Stahlman, Polk County Development Coordinator, informed the commissioners that he is inviting Hardee, DeSoto, Okeechobee and Highlands counties to join the Polk effort to plan their own programs.

Barbara Monahan, presently employed by the state manpower office and scheduled to direct the Polk County planning operation, explained that federal grants will be used to finance manpower planning.

In response to commissioners questions concerning what the manpower planners would do, Monahan explained that the office would deal primarily with providing services to the county's "disadvantaged." The program developed for the five counties would include job training and means for keeping disadvantaged youngsters in school while paying them "small amounts of money for small amounts of work".

Since governmental funding for the manpower program is based on population, Polk authorities feel that more money can be obtained to finance a competent staff of planners if other counties are invited to join forces in the effort.

Stahlman expressed his own misgivings about regional planning versus local planning, saying that local planning is more conducive to solving local

oblems. However, in this ase, he said he could see advantages in taking the task away from the state staff whose members are so far removed from the problems that county governments experience.

--Heard commission Chairman Norman "Jug" Heston introduce Carl Beimly as the new executive secretary of the Highlands County Builders Association.

-Offered no objection to liberalizing the beverage license now held by the Sun 'n Lake Estates Country Club.

-Rescinded their action of last week in appointing Jack Ryan to membership on the Central Florida Regional Planning Council. In Ryan's place, they appointed Mary Ellen Ward. More than a thousand persons, mostly elderly, crowded the council room and endorsed the idea. John Stanley, president of one of the several retired residents' associations, told the mayor and councilmen that "I could have packed this room with five times as many people tonight. We are thrilled at the idea of such a bus service, especially with so many of our people too elderly to operate automobiles."

OTHERS SPOKE of how this would alleviate some of the woes that are sure to come with the fuel shortage. an Inwagen, who will call his firm Dutch Transit Inc., said his buses are four-cylinder machines and operate on diesel fuel. He hopes to give "on the hour" service to the communities and be in service by June, pending approval of the public service authorities, who have permitted him to submit his plans and proposed routes.

The buses would serve, additionally, the shopping centers, hospital, library, high school, Spring Lake, airport, and several mobile home parks.

The bus fare for the "in Sebring" routes would "most likely be about 40 cents one-way, and perhaps a dollar to the distant towns" and villages, an Inwagen said.

Neighbors expressed fears that duplex dwellings to be constructed by Williams will become a labor camp for itinerant farm workers and, as such, will depreciate property values in the area.

The county commissioners denied Williams' re-zoning request.

Residents of Spring Lake subdivision were successful in convincing the commissioners to deny the request of Norwood T. Hoecker that his property, located on U.S. 98 adjacent to Flamingo Estates, be re-zoned from agricultural to general retail and mobile home and residential subdivision.

Hoecker was unable to convince the commissioners that his land, adjacent to a railroad, an airport, and a dog pound would be improved by its being used as a mobile home community. Owners of Spring Hill property said they feared that one mobile home subdivision might attract others and would overtax traffic conditions along U.S. 98.

### Summer rains raise lakes

The summer rains in Highlands County have been widely beneficial to ranchers, citrus growers and farmers. Lake Jackson and Little

Lake Jackson have begun to rise slowly from the frequent showers. On July 30 Lake Jackson was 99.44 and Little Lake Jackson was 100.24 feet above sea level. This is a little over a four-inch rise on each of the lakes so far in July and an inch rise since last Friday. over Highlands County for maximum growth of all pasture grasses, and grass planting is now being done on many ranches. Also the rains have been generally adequate for citrus to where no supplemental irrigation is needed except for young trees.

Most of the caladiums are grown southeast of Lake Istokpoga and that area has been having heavy rain and is slightly wet in some places. A check this week showed that the channels and structures in the Istokpoga Marsh Watershed were doing a good job of handling the excess water to prevent flood damage that could have been caused by a six inch rain that feel in the watershed project area July 21 and 22. The south and east part of the county still continues to receive heavy rainfall.

This is the time of year when the Soil Conservation Service, in connection with the U.S.

Fish and Wildlife Service stocks farm fish ponds for recreational use. fingerlings will be delivered to stock 15 ponds Aug. 2 for Dan Bennett, Bruce Blount, Jaime Carrion, James Caudill, Bill Driggers, Leonard Godwin, Howard Livingston, Lost Lake Groves, Inc., W.E. annual School Planning Institute sponsored by the School of Education at Stanford University at Palo Alto, Calif. Subject of Hodapp's address was "New Towns and Their Implications for Education."

Hodapp pointed out that Coral Springs, like all other "new towns" being developed in the United States, is experiencing problems in planning for schools for a fast-growing population.

"It is a serious problem which cannot be averted," he said. "But some new communities are meeting the problem more successfully than others."

Coral Springs is "doing well" in solving its education problems even though located in one of the fastest growing counties in the nation, Hodapp reported.

"Broward County, because of its accelerated growth, has a greater problem in planning for future education needs than most other areas," Hodapp told the institute, citing the fact that Broward had only 40,000 people in 1940 but now has over 700,000.

has found need for the ultramodern James S. Hunt Elementary School and the county's largest temporary elementary school. Plans have been approved by the Broward County School Board for construction of another elementary and a middle school. Additional educational facilities, including a high school, are being planned.

"The problem of planning for education in a new community is almost like the old axiom of "What came first, the chicken or the egg?" Hodapp commented. "In this case, what is first, the students or the schools? Do we build the schools, then wait to see how many students we'll have? Or do we wait for the students, then build the schools?" It is possible to plan too many schools while also quite possible to underplan, he

Many developers, according to Hodapp, have promised more than they can deliver where others have become too involved in what must be a community project. Some developers have purchased barns or warehouses for temporary use as classrooms while others have built schools for lease to the school board. Neither have proved satisfactory, he said.







# Developer lists techniques for good environment management

Coral Ridge Properties, developers of Spring Lake, a 6,000 acre planned community southeast of Sebring, actually improves the raw land through application of some very careful environmental

management techniques, Paul Britton, vice president of land development for Coral Ridge, told an audience of over 100 at the Highlands County Ag Center Thursday noon.

According to Britton, Coral

Ridge has proved that a conscientious developer can turn raw land into even better, more marketable, property.

He conceded that some of the techniques being used, though they add cost to the lots, are cheaper in the long run because the land increases in value, rather than declines, following development.

The techniques are as

—Laying telephone lines underground at a cost of \$6 per foot.

—Building canals-not just ditches-and encouraging the propagation of game fish therein.

—Leaving as many trees as possible when clearing land, and removing trash by hauling away, not burning.

-Installing silt screens in canals.

—Using a specially designed cement block upon which grass will grow, and thus making grass driveways in place of regular concrete.

—Installing utility poles which look like trees.

—Using a new process for removing the organic compounds from muck so that structures can be built on it, once dry.


—Using aquatic weed control programs for keeping canals clear


—Using an "exciting" new method of treating sewage affluent so it can be restored to fresh-water clarity.



### SPRING LAKE PARK RECREATION AREA \_ 1973












### Florida tourists created building industry

Persons who have been critical of tourists are doing Florida and Highlands County no favors, J. P. Taravella, president of Coral Ridge Properties, Inc., the developer of Spring Lake, stated Saturday morning.

Taravella's remarks were made to a large audience attending the opening of Spring Lake Village II, located on Highway 98 east of Sebring.

"We could all panic at the energy crisis," he pointed out. "But if we are a little patient the problem will be solved."

He praised Florida Governor Reubin Askew's efforts to obtain more gasoline for the state. "We're not getting our fair share now," Taravella stated, urging citizens to write their state and federal officials asking for their help.

Taravella complimented the developers of the Vanguard CitiCar being manufactured at the Sebring Air Terminal industrial park for their foresight and for their faith and investment in central Florida.

"We need industry here," he stressed. "Without jobs we will have no young people. Without young people we will have no

state. "We're not getting our one to serve the rest of us, and fair share now." Taravella the area would die."

"We're not going to sell a bunch of lots and leave them here," he emphasized. We're not in the lot selling business. That is bad business because that kind of development does not add value to the land."

# Developer lists techniques for good environment management

Coral Ridge Properties, developers of Spring Lake, contend their work is actually improving the raw land. The 6,000 acre planned community which lies southwest of Sebring has been developing very rapidly, but avoiding the blight and blunders of fast growth.

The second section of Spring Lake homes is now open with eight new homes by independent local builders on display. The Spring Lake Shopping Plaza is due for formal opening in April and a second phase of the plaza will commence almost immediately.

Paul Britton, vice president of land development for Coral Ridge, in a recent address listed some of the techniques being used to not only develop the Spring Lake community but to improve, in every sense, the land.

According to Britton, Coral Ridge has proved that a conscientious developer can turn raw land into even better, more marketable property.

He conceded that some of the techniques being used, through they add cost to the lots, are cheaper in the long run because the land increases in value, rather than declines, following development.

The techniques are as

- -Laying telephone lines underground at a cost of \$6 per foot.
- --Building canals-not just ditches-and encouraging the propagation of game fish therein.
- -Leaving as many trees as possible when clearing land, and removing trash by hauling away, not burning.

-Installing silt screens in canals.

-Using a specially designed cement block upon which grass will grow, and thus making grass driveways in place of regular concrete.

--Installing utility poles which look like trees.

-Using a new process for removing the organic compounds from muck so that structures can be built on it, once dry.

-Using aquatic week control programs for keeping canals clear.

-Using an "exciting" new method of treating sewage affluent so it can be restored to fresh-water clarity.

In addition, Britton said, Coral Ridge employs a plant biologist and an anthropologist and other scientific personnel full time to continually study new ideas and methods for preserving and improving the environment at Coral Ridge developments.

### **Bus service hearing** postponed to March

A public hearing on a proposed local transit system in Highlands County has been postponed for one month.

According to C. L. "Dutch" VanInwagon, president of Dutch Transit, Inc., the Florida Public Service Commission has been asked for a continuance by Greyhound Bus Lines.

The reason for the postponement involves one of the six bus routes proposed by Van Inwagon in his application. It is the Avon Park to Sebring to Lake Placid line on Route 27, presently served by Greyhound.

The other routes as planned, will involve one bus each in Avon Park and Lake Placid, one in Sebring and another Sebring bus with a wider range...Spring Lake, the airport, shopping centers and additional trailer courts.

There is a strong possibility, said attorney James Livingston, that temporary authority will be granted Dutch Transit to run buses prior to the hearing, on all but the Hwy. 27 route. If so, that does not mean the decision is final, Livingston said.

He cautioned that only a large and interested turnout on March 28 will help make any temporary service final. The hearing before representatives of the state Public Service Commission will be held in the Agri-Civic Center, south of Sebring on Route 27, at 9 a.m.

SEVERAL MANUFACTURING firms have located, expanded and added more personnel in recent months, she



# Hearing slated on area buses

Proposed bus coverage for Sebring and Highlands County is not just a flash in the pan. C. L. "Dutch" Van InWagen, president of Dutch Transit, Inc., has every intention of going through with the project. Everything hinges upon approval by the Public Service Commission.

A public hearing on the subject has been scheduled for 9 a.m., Friday, Feb. 22, at the Agri-Civic Center in Sebring. Officials of the state commission will be present.

Van InWagen said his plans have not changed. Once approval is given by the commission there will be one bus in operation within 30 days and another every 30 days thereafter, for a total of six buses. Within six months the entire service will be operative.

According to the routes set up, one bus will cover down-

Sebring, one will go circle the lake every hour, a third will travel from Avon Park to Sebring to Lake Placid, via Route

The fourth bus will be an extirely Avon Park vehicle, the fifth is a Lake Placid bus and the sixth will cover a wider range of Highlands County, from the shopping district of Sebring, to Southgate Plaza, to the airport and thence to Spring Lake.

Intended as a way of relieving downtown congestion and servicing non-drivers stranded in mobile home parks, service will be on an hourly basis for most lines, said Van InWagen.

Buses, some of which have already been delivered, are 20-passenger vehicles which will load in off-street areas. Fares will be 40 cents for a one way trip, probably more for the long route which takes in more of the county.

Views and opinions of county residents will be welcomed at the meeting before the Public Service Commission.

# Highlands County growth no Mickey Mouse affair

"The impact of Mickey Mouse is spilling over into Highlands County," according to County Commissioner C. J. "Buddy" Wise. Projecting the estimated population growth of the county within the next few years, Wise put the possible total at 95,000-150,000 by 1980.

He said the surge would bring with it attendent problems, but, "We have plenty of room in Highlands County. We are, in a manner of speaking, one of the few untouched areas in the state."

The commissioner addressed a meeting of Spring Lake brokers at a luncheon Thursday. Mickey Mouse was, of course, a reference to Disneyworld. He said people are first drawn to Florida by the lure of the attraction, then stay because of the state's other attributes.

Wise predicted that an

aggressive sales promotion might "zoom" the present population to 150,000. Along with it, he cautioned, would also come problems, the burden placed on the working population.

"Demands for services will increase if the trend continues. We would need 20 additional firemen and 30 more policemen; more teachers and new schools; certainly additional water, sewers and streets." He assessed the cost of the educational changes alone at \$8 million.

The commissioner illustrated his talk with the "county pie," a circular diagram of the budget. Of the 100 percent circle the greatest slice, 61.3, is spent on education. The remainder is split up into 16.7 for the general fund, 4.5 for roads, 10 per cent fines and forfeitures, 1.7 health

and 4 per cent, hospital.

Of the county's 619 miles of road, 211 miles are unpaved, he said. Other statistics to be digested along with lunch were—of 66,000 county acres, less than two percent are developed; of 150,000 lots, less than 1.3 percent are filled.

Wise said the official population figure of the county is 38,217, an increase of 30 percent. Of that amount, primarily engaged in agriculture, 46.1 percent of the people are between the ages of 20-64 and 20.3 are over 65.

The commissioner brought up a long-standing problem: "our little landfill," He said that refusal of the state to allow a location in DeSoto County "doesn't necessarily fall under the area of their business. And by the way...we are not finished with them yet! We will appeal."

He cited sweeping changes in ecological policy as perhaps prohibiting landfills in the future. "In the next decade or so I'm not sure if we will be allowed to bury things in the ground."


Wise also brushed on zoning, which he said is in its infancy in the county. "Your commissioners are aware of the problems, and you can count on the board to keep up with changes."

Questions from the brokers revolved mostly around the need for roads in deveopments. Wise told them the early developers did not put in roads and, by law, the county is not permitted to accept a road not built to its specifications.

"We realize that some of this is awfully frustrating, but as the streets fill up and more persons in the area start to vote and pay taxes, the county will eventually maintain the roads."

· He cited a new law passed in 1973 that requires builders to install roads in new developments, adding,

'I think most of our problems are in the past. We will find a workable solution."



### Swaine new city attorney

Macbeth, who was present at the council table, appeared to kpect the action, and complimented council on its choice of Swaine, "I know him and I know he will make a good city attorney."

Macbeth said he would turn over some of the projects on which he has been engaged, and would be happy to discuss them with his successor.

"I have appreciated the opportunity to serve over the years and, I hope, make some contribution to Sebring and its citizens. I have enjoyed working with all of you. Your cooperation has been fine and we have had a good relationship."

However, the attorney did not depart without submitting what he called his "challenge".



### Spring Lake referendum passes 6-0





Expressing himself as hopeful, Mallard was warned by Hensley not to burn any other bridges he might have.

# Smelting plant proposed here

A three-phase operation that would include a smelting plant for aircraft parts has been proposed at Sebring Industrial Park. Making the request before the airport authority Thursday was Gene Mallard, of the Southern Aero Co.

"I'm proposing a new industry for Sebring," he said, "but I won't pretend it's a clean one. We would be complying with state and federal anti-pollution laws, but a certain amount of smoke is permitted. Sometimes things can get into the furnace we're not aware of...sealants, rubber insulation...and give trouble."

He went on to say that with two newly-devised filters in the stack and a chemical neutralizer as a last resort, the trouble should be eliminated.

Mallard is currently breaking up old Constellations recently purchased by Richard Bergstresser. He told authority members that he was captured by Sebring, had settled his family here and would not care to have to move elsewhere.

That, he said, was one of the

reasons for selecting the industrial park for his proposed plant. Other factors were proximity to a railroad spur, five acres removed from normal traffic and, "This area is due for heavy industry; the labor market is here."

Further, he said that aside from a small one in Miami, there are no smelting plants in the state. The closest large one is in Birmingham, Ala. Mallard claimed that central Florida is a prime location because it is within several hours of any part of the state.

The three phases outlined would start with a holding area for aircraft parts, chopped up and waiting for the market in metal to reverse itself. "The bottom has dropped out of the market and at present I need storage room."

He expects the economy to right itself by June, at which time Mallard plans the smelting plant as the second phase. The third, two or more years away, would be a "phasing down" of the smelting operation and conversion to small equipment manufacture.

members that it would not look like an auto junkyard. "I want to keep it small...in one side and out the other. I am mainly trying to find out if you would be interested in this type of industry."

In answer to questions from members he revealed that six different metals which usually comprise aircraft aluminum are separated in the furnace, with iron rising to the top. The remaining aluminum is formed into ingots for shipping while iron ingots are shipped separately.



# Parking on grass ok thanks to Sebring

A Sebring industry is playing a role in an experiment at Coral Springs wherein over 200 years of American habit and custom is being upset by a parking lot that has signs urging drivers to "Please Park On The Grass."

H & H Concrete Co. at the Sebring Air Park is furnishing specially designed concrete block for the project. Paul L. Britton, vice president of development for Coral Ridge Properties, Inc., said future projects include Spring Lake.

Posted in the parking lot of the new Electra Energy Conservation Home in Coral Springs, the "Park on the Grass" signs are creating considerable consternation and not a little disbelief.

In December 1972 Coral Ridge researchers hit upon the idea of attempting to reduce the vast expanses of concrete and asphalt paved surfaces that are among the less desirable aspects of urban living.

Goal was to find a way to return some of these driveways and parking lots to grass, and at the same time retain the surface stability necessary to support vehicular traffic.

It was found this could be accomplished by using cellular concrete paving blocks installed to form a rough paved area, then covered with a thin layer of top soil which was then seeded or sodded.

H&H Concrete is making the blocks for Coral Ridge Properties, the company that is developing the residential community of Spring Lake along Route 98, south of the Sebring Air Park.

The grass-covered parking lot at the Electra Home is the forerunner to a strong effort to "Keep America Green" by urging drivers to "Park On The Grass!"

Coral Ridge Properties researchers envision expansive front lawns covered with lush, green grass even though a driveway may be hidden under the grass leading to the garage or carport.

It may mean more grass to mow but it certainly will be more pleasing to the eye.

### to be regulated

"There are a number of sewer systems in the county today for which we don't regulate any rates, or fees for service, or anything else," Serv Cou Jr. County Attorney Robert Dunty told commissioners Tuesday.

Calling for regulation of franchise operators, Dunty said, "Some effort needs to be made by the board in my judgment to keep someone from getting a franchise and then not doing anything about

"If you're going to give a man an exclusive franchise - \* - Assured Robert Rose of like we have on garbage disposal - then they should be made to perform," Dunty said. "And there should be certain things they've got to do to earn the exclusive nature of their license."

Dunty cited the cable TV franchise in Lake Placid and water system franchise in DeSoto City as examples of the types of operations that might be improved through regulation.

The specific franchise agreement he was preparing for commissioner's review dealt specifically with water and sewage systems, Dunty

There are from 12 to 15 sewage plants in the county not now licensed or regulated, Dunty told commiseioners.

"How would that (franchise agreement) affect mobile home parks with their own treatment plants?," Betty Bolin asked.

Dunty replied that it would offer park operators protection from competition while it would provide users of the sewage system with equitable fees and regulated services.

Commissioner C. J. "Buddy," Wise expressed commissioners' general approval of Dunty's work in preparing sample franchise agreement

"I think it's an outstanding idea and long overdue," Wise

In other actions, commissioners:

### Red tape dams sand bar

Tennyson's classic poem "Crossing the Bar" may not have taken as long to write as it is taking a to have a sandbar removed from the mouth of Arbuckle Creek.

The sand bar has ruined the summer for residents of Spring Lake subdivision, and Barnes' Fishing Camp near the head of the creek. Roger Dice, engineer for Spring Lake, said that in the summer southeast winds cause the bar to form and once formed, other winds do not dislodge it.

The blockade has stifled commercial fishing from the camp and made it necessary for residents of the development to drag their boats a long way to water, according to reports.

Spring Lake volunteered to remove the obstuction at its own expense, but found that a permit was necessary. Dice and Jack Ryan, director of Spring Lake's local enterprise, has approached county commissioners only to learn that approval for the permit

must come from the Central and South Florida Flood Control District (FCD ).

Administrative assistant Charles Cullens sent a letter and on Aug. 8 two FCD engineers from the Okeechobee office toured the Arbuckle Creek area with Dice, Cullens and Commissioner Norman "Jug" Heston.

The engineers took measurements, made notes and agreed that "the situation

was serious," said Ryan. They told the Highlands County group they would receive an answer to the findings within 10 days. Nothing was heard.

The News contacted the FDC office in West Palm Beach and spoke to Richard Gregg who, after checking, said his office had "no objections" to the removal of the sand bar by Spring Lake engineers. He said final approval would be up to trustees of International Improvements Trust Fund.

This week county commissioners receive "a whole batch of things" from the regulatory division of FDC. The kit and caboodle includes, said Cullens, an application form, a book on regulations and a book on how to apply for a permit. He said county engineer Gordon Hays would look over the collection.

A perplexing letter accompanied the package from J.B. Jackson, director of the division. It stated that the application would apply to "a dredging operation to remove a shoaling problem at the mouth of Arbuckle Creek," and that "apparently the operation included redirecting the flow of water."

Fishermen and boaters have no intention of redirecting the flow of water, according to officials. Their only concern is in letting water return to its normal flow and "crossing the bar."

# Flood control hearing plans misunderstood, says agent

Much misunderstanding about flood control projects in Highlands County was created by the the public hearing held here last month, county commissioners were told Tuesday.

A. M. Waggener, a Lykes Brothers Inc. agent, has had second thoughts about conclusions reached at the Sept. 16 public hearing held at the Agricivic Center by the Central and Southern Flood Control District.

According to him, attempts at water control in the Lake Istokpoga region were begun during the 1920's.

In the 1950's, an Istokpoga water control committee was formed when some 30 interested ranchers and farmers in the area contributed to a program under which water control structures were constructed.

Waggener said he has found several copies of a document that describes the Istokpoga water control program that was "sold" to the county in July 1959 by the flood control district.

"That original plan was pretty good," he said. "We ought to stick to it."

Despite the fact that Lake Istokpoga flooded SR-621 in 1947 and 1948 and the lakebed became a dustbowl in 1956, Waggener said he feels the flood control program as originally described has served the county well.

The purpose of his appearing before the county commissioners, Waggener said, was to solicit the board's support of the control district's 1959 plan entitled "The Proposed Water Control Project for Lake Istokpoga."

Waggener left a copy of the 1959 plan with commissioners who promised to study it carefully and then inform him whether or not they will go on record as supporting the old project in lieu of a new program being pushed now by the flood control district.



He said the local firm, which now employs 102 persons at its Sebring airport assembly plant, will increase its payrole to 150 by the end of next year as a result of this contract and other signed business. Beaumont also announced the availability of a new higher-speed model in the company line of 10 mph faster than the standard model.

It is equipped with two extra batteries, a 48-volt charger, a specially designed General Electric 3.5 hp motor, and four

wheel shock absorbers.

The model also offers lowerhalf two-tone paint, a special decal on front fenders and custom side moldings. Base price of the SV-48 is \$2,690; for the standard model, \$2,490.

"We offer the new model after many months of research and development and at the request of our dealers who want a broader market coverage," Beaumont stated. "We believe this new model will open a vast new market that may heretofore have been closed."

## What population decrease?

While many schools in cities around the nation are being sold or placed in mothballs, Highlands County does not reflect the same decline in children. Although all returns are not in, local classes bode well to match or surpass those of last year.

According to their principals, schools are still lacking a full complement of children. Some families remain on

vacation in the North, migrant laborers have not yet returned from their jobs around the country, and several families are in the process of moving.

Still, present enrollment during this second week of the school year appears to be steady as she goes and growing steadily. National statistics hold that the birth rate is dropping off, yet the greatest increase at Woodlawn, according to Jack Ingle, has been at the kindergarten level. First day enrollment was 636 as against 609 last year, Ingle said. As of Friday the count was 665, 651 in 1973 with 28 more kindergartners added.

Fred Wild, which takes in grades 1-5 shows a slight dip to date, reported Ellis Watson. After the first week 628 were entered (635 in 1973), with more expected momentarily. "We average 25 to a class, so we are happy," said Watson.

The Sebring Middle School expects 840-850 students before the year is out, estimated Wally Cox, slightly topping last year's peak of 830. As of now the comparable figures for the first week are 760 this year and 755 last year. Cox added that

this week the count jumped to 796, while 772 were tallied last year.

Sebring High School is rolling along, said Billy Cason, who pointed to an enrollment of 1020 on Friday. At the same time last year the count was only 907.

Cason feels that Highlands County will not prove the national figures concerning a dropping birth rate. "So many are moving into the county from the high density areas along the coast. They like our environment and our style of living here," he said.

"We haven't got them all yet," explained Malcolm Ross of Lake Placid High School, so at this point we're a little under last year. We ended with 825 in the spring and so far we only have 810. But I expect we'll be about the same as last year." Friday enrollment showed 790, against 820 last year.

"There is no drop in our kindergarten enrollment this year," said David Robinson of Lake Placid Elementary School. "We have 116 5-year olds out of a present total of 946. At the same time in 1973 the figure was 921." Robinson

count added that he expects the 772 were school to go over 1,000 before all is said and done.

The principal believes that birth rates go in cycles, and that even national statistics will pick up again after due course.

Lake Placid has "room to grow" in comparison with other county municipalities, Robinson said. Classes average between 25-30 at present, but the mobility of families may swell that number in the future.

Elmo Roberts of Avon Park Middle School said there will be approximately the same number of students as last year, once the full crew has assembled. The first day's score showed 746 registered, climbing to 804 this week. In 1973, Friday topped off at 850.

It was the same story at Avon Park High School, where the new principal, John Crittenden, said the sign-up so far, 725, is an increase over last year's 688.

First week's entrants totaled 697, whereas they were 707 in 1973. Obviously even without missing students the high school has already beaten its

past record.

Avon Park has the sole county elementary school with a marked decrease in enrollment. Norris Brooks said the 827 students clocked in as of last Friday are considerably less than the 903 in '73.

Although he still expects the total to rise over 900 before the year is concluded, his school has shown the most reflection of the national trend. Kindergartners, said Brooks, have dropped from 150 last year to 120 at present.

The grand total of county enrollments at the conclusion of the first week of school came to 7173, over last year's 7166, an increase of 7.

However, with each of the county's school principals predicting a second wave of students within the next week or so, the general picture will be one of non-explosive growth. That is the tempo which most appeals to countians, it is often said.

# Douglass aids Chamber with its \$ homework

The shifting of enrollments, the school district's record budget, and "self-enhancing" education were discussed by School Superintendent George Douglass at the monthly Sebring Chamber of Commerce breakfast.

At the end of the first week of school the number of students was only seven above a year ago, Douglass reported, but it is the shifting of the school population which creates the problem.

Students at Avon Park schools number 137 less than a year ago, and Lake Placid schools report five fewer on hand, while Sebring is up 144 – all in only about five classrooms.

"When the growth is all in one community, this poses a problem," Douglass continued. "We used to have only one bus serving Lorida" now there are five. Spring Lake used to have only 15 students, now there are 55."

Sebring High School, he said, has the largest enrollment of any school in the district--1,020, an increase of 113 over last year.

If economic problems at the national level are resolved.

Douglass stated, Highlands County should experience significant growth in the future.

Discussing the district's record budget for next year, Douglass said appearances are sometimes deceiving. The budget, he said, is swollen by the fact that for the first time the district's \$850,000 school lunch programs are included, although they are paid for by cash receipts at the cafeterias.

An additional \$490,000 is from cash carried over for the construction of the new administrative complex now underway at the E.O. Douglas site, and for air conditioning the Woodlawn and Avon Park Elementary schools.

This will leave only Avon Park and Sebring middle schools and a portion of Lake Placid High still without air conditioning, he said.

Douglass noted that no racial incidents have occurred in Highlands schools, "This hasn't been just luck--we've worked darn hard at it."

He paid tribute to parents, teachers and local school administrators for this but added, "We have to continue to work at it."

One of the most promising efforts in that direction, he reported, is the district's involvement in a concept known as "self enhancing" educational method of controlling student behavior patterns by recognizing that young people are individuals.

If communications—the basis of any teacher-pupil relationship—is to succeed, then it must be in terms which are meaningful to the individual pupil, taking into consideration his background and his attitudes, Douglass said

Special programs, financed by federal grants, have already been held for test groupings of students and teachers here. And a request is to be made soon in Tallahassee for additional federal monies to fund a three-year, school-district-wide program which would utilize the latest in techniques and training in this area.

"So far, the results have been most rewarding," Douglass said, "and we are certainly hoping to get this additional grant."

He noted that despite federal laws, actual integration in our society has thus far been pretty much limited to the public schools. There is still very little of it on the job, in the churches, in social life or in the home.

Douglass concluded: "If we're going to make it in this society, it will depend on our inter-relationships. We must learn to communicate with our fellow human beings in the public schools, and we must equip our schools to deal with it properly."

# Airport decisions wait on Greenwood

A new proposal to lease a portion of the Sebring Airport track was tabled recently, until the Airport Authority talks to John Greenwood, promoter of the Sebring 12-hour sports car race. The talk is set for next week.

Greenwood previously presented a plan for leasing the track, plus additional acreage for expansion, and room in idustrial park for a manufacturing plant.

At the last meeting of the authority a request from the Bendex Company was laid side temporarily. Bendex had asked for a year-round lease, using the section of track for braketesting. Another client for the track is the Chrysler Company, also for testing purposes.

One industrial prospect received consideration. The Wise Co., Memphis, Tenn. is seeking to establish a seat cushion plant in industrial park. The company requires approximately 30,000 square feet, a sprinklered steel building on four acres, and rail service.

According to a spokesman for the authority, the company, which makes cushions for boats, trucks and similar products, would-employ about 100 persons, primarily women with sewing experience.

By terms of the agreement ie authority has offered to construct the building, which would be financed over 15 years.

In other business, authority

members hired Ridge Security for guard service and announced sale of the six stranded Constellations, which their owner, Mid Air, Inc. of California, was not able to redeem. The sale was held Monday by the Highlands County Sheriff's Department.

Members also decided to repair the airport's old sewage pumps until the updated sewer system is completed. They felt it would be less costly to do so, than to purchase pumps from the Sebring lift station when it is phased out.

Representatives of the Enviornmental Pollution Agency will visit the airport in the near future, to make an inspection tour.

# Shifting students change bus routes

A shifting population in Highlands County has resulted in a new, whole new, bus schedule this coming year. School Board members were shown the amended route map by route and safety officer George Crist at the regular meeting Thursday.

One additional bus route will serve the DeSoto City area, one in Lake Placid to take in Placid Lakes and Lake Childs, and two buses to Sebring High School, now that it has gone to eight periods a day. Crist said they hope to have no more than 55 persons to a bus.

New buses which the school board ordered this year are still undelivered, with no guarantee of when they will be assembled and ready for operation, reported Garland Boggus, director of purchasing. Until then they will make do' with some vintage models.

In all, there will be 46 buses and 67 routes starting the fall season.

Some money will be saved, in that the routes will be seven miles shorter in the southern part of the country and 23 miles are being cut off the eastern region. The change was made possible because new drivers live closer to the appointed areas

### Improvement district for Sun 'n Lake Sebring set up

By unanimous vote April 16 Highlands County commission enacted an ordinance creating a Sun 'n Lake of Sebring Improvement District.

Sun 'n Lake developer Jack Weisser had sought special legislation creating such a district in 1973, but Highlands County commissioners had opposed that proposal.

Commissioner Robert Skipper noted Tuesday that the new proposal had been "changed since it was presented to the Legislature last year."

The ordinance enacted this week is modeled after the special law which established an improvement district for Spring Lakes, but is somewhat more closely restricted than the Spring Lakes law.

Earlier this month Sun 'n Lake developers, Jack and Ron Weisser, had a long work session with the county commission where the proposed ordinance was reviewed pageby-page. The commissioners listed three changes which had been incorporated into the ordinance adopted this week.

#### **District Defined**

The ordinance sets the boundaries for the improvement district (roughly the same as the lines for the old Maxcy Ranch north of Sebring and west of U.S. 27). The law provides for a governing body which will determine community improvements to be made, sell bonds for financing these improvements and pro rate the costs among the property owners.

The governing board will be elected by property owners who actually live in the district or the owners who own as much as one acre of land.

At the work session Bill Van Baalen, Property Owners Association executive, had questioned the constitutionality of a provision that voting powers would be distributed on the basis of one vote per resident and one vote

would leave the developer with his large block of votes in control of the district for many years. The Weissers readily admitted this to be true, even estimated that it would be 10 to 15 years before control of the district passed from the developer to the residents.

They argued the same principal is followed in other improvement districts since "it is desirable to keep the developer involved for as long as possible."

#### Restrict Powers

The developers did agree, however, to restrict the district board's powers for purchase and improvement lands for recreation, limit the purchase price of lands the developer sells to the district for recreation purposes. If the developer sells the district for a park, for example, the price cannot be higher than the per acre price the developer paid for the land.

commissioners The requested a provision that persons not holding contracts for Sun 'n Lake Sebring land will be exempted from paying the district taxes for drainage and roads.

A fourth change was agreed to prior to the ordinance passage this week. At the urging of Commissioner Ken Wilkinson a clause was added requiring the district to seek competitive bids on materials and work to be within the district.

Wilkinson agreed that, after the bids have been announced, the developer should be free to negotiate a contract. He agreed, "The low bid is not always the best bid."

The ordinance provides for district improvements such as central water and sewage

#### User Will Pay

County Attorney R. P. Dunty Jr. had advised the board, "Six thousand people per week are coming into Florida. I don't know how the State of Florida per acre. He pointed out this can survive without making

provision for the man who is going to use services to pay for them."

While the district board selects the improvement projects and financing, the money will be collected via the county tax assessor and tax collector offices. These officers charge for their services according to a scale of fees based on a percentage of the revenue. The fee schedule is developed by the state.

The Sun 'n Lake Sebring development includes 7,000 acres. According to the master plan for it, a portion of it will be retained as natural area and a portion given to parks and recreation.

He added that irrigation withdrawals (Indian Prairie area) average 36,050 acre-feet during dry season and 9,078 acre-feet in wet season. Irrigators would be allowed to use water from the canals, but no more withdrawals would be permitted beyond the minimum stage.

Mrs. Edna Pearce Lockett, representing the Istokpoga Marsh Watershed, read a prepared statement objecting to major changes in the present levels. "We have buildings, pumps, etc. based on previous schedules."

She pointed to Spring Lake Development, noting that it was "built on land that is often flooded. You shouldn't lower the lake to 36 feet to protect this type of development."

Mrs. Pearce Lockett also read an editorial from the Sunday Miami Herald which was critical of the FCD proposal.

Storch repeated that they do not plan to lower the lake level and there is no plan to change the flood control schedule.

Al Tumbleston questioned the statement in light of paragraph 4 in the regulations:

The District may, pursuant to notice, allow the minimum levels to be temporarily lowered for environmental water quality reasons. He also asked why the locks at the lower end of the lake were open during dry season.

A letter from the FCD executive director to the county commissioners in May was quoted. The salient point was the statement that "the district also envisions withdrawals from the lake below the regulations, as required to meet agricultural demands in the area between Lake Okeechobee and Istokpoga."

Storch said he did not know about the letter and reiterated, "We do not envision releases for irrigation past the 37 foot level." He added that the locks will be open only when there is a surplus.

C. M. Payne asked about shallow wells in the vicinity of the canals. "Could you tell a

property owner to shut off his pump?" Another representative of the FCD replied that the rules do not affect "domestic and essential service supplies."

"So you'll let the cows and the sugar cane die," said Payne.

Storch explained that shallow wells which can be proved to have no hydraulic connection with underground water will receive permits.

Robert Barnes brought up the problems of Arbuckle Creek, where "you can't get a boat into or out of the water." Taking up the plaint Ed Delaney added that the next step he foresees is FCD gates at the ends of the creeks.

At this point a man from Okeechobee said that during dry season Lake Okeechobee is 11-feet deep "and you're holding 37 feet of water."

A Highlander answered him with, "If we let you have it we could walk across Arbuckle Creek." To which the Okeechobee man replied, "Who cares about Arbuckle Creek?" A majority in the audience told him.

Storch said the present creek flow would be maintained and added that the nine-man FCD board emphasizes flood control drainage in a regional water use plan. John Riley asked who were the nine members of the board based in West Palm Beach, and was told the information would be supplied to him.

"We are tired of canals," said someone and Tumbleston added, "People here remember the line they were fed on the Kissimmee River." There was agreement from the audience.

A Lake Placid man asked about the Istokpoga canal locks and was told that a "control structure" project has been authorized in the Istokpoga Canal and is being worked on by the Corps of Engineers.

Someone asked who had the authority to make the authorization and was told that the matter would be discussed with him after the meeting.

A man representing property owners said a request had been made to keep the lake at 38 feet for recreation purposes.

"We have to drag our boats a mile to water. This is a 36-mile lake front, with a lot of houses and ranches. Is there no consideration for people living on this lake? We're willing to share, but don't we have basic rights, instead of taking from us and dumping water into Okeechobee?"

Storch said the basin would not be sacrificed to fill Okeechobee. He said the board felt they were indeed recognizing the people by setting the rules.

Speaking for the Seminole Indians, Bill Smith said they are interested in Istokpoga and the watershed and lend their support to the new regulations. He noted, "the people making the most complaints are the ones who are going to be helped the most."

"We're gun-shy because of Kissimmee," said a member of the audience. Lorenzo Walker commented that to his understanding the FCD would have complete custody of all water above and below ground after July 1975.

Back on the subject of canals someone mentioned, "Let people know you have a lake and they'll come dig you a canal. They're pretty good at that."

Tumbleston said, "We were raped of the Kissimmee River and the FCD was responsible." He asked the meaning of the "environmental quality" clause.

Storch replied that "in the event it becomes necessary, we would temporarily waive the levels and go to a draw-down."

Primarily unopposed to the regulations, an engineer representing Spring Lake made some suggestions for changes in the wording of the proposed rules, and requested a smooth curve rather than a stepped curve of projected lake levels.

John Watson of Silver Harbor Ranch felt the water storage in Istokpoga should be left to carry over into the irrigation season. He men tioned water loss last year.

Zeb Grant of FCD replied that when the water was low it was being used for irrigation rather than being lowered.

On Orian Reynolds' commendation the meeting was officially over, although most of those milling around were still giving the war cry "Remember the Kissimmee."

## 'Rape of Kissimmee' combats FCD

Over 200 persons turned out at the Agri-Civic Center Monday night to hear proposed new rules and regulations, but they weren't buying.

> The director of resource planning, William Storch, said the proposed rules had nothing to do with regular schedules of Istokpoga, which have already been adopted. Those apply only to flood control, establishing a level of 37 and a half to 39 and a half feet.

Monday's subject was concerned with "beneficial consumptive usage," which sets the minimums beyond which withdrawals of water would not be allowed. Enforcement would be primarily through withholding permits, Storch indicated, drawing cries of "We might as well be in Russia."

Storch made his presentation through use of charts. He said there are constraints on the amount of water available and

named two potential sources. Indian Prairie basin generates a run-off into Lake Okeechobee and the second component is water stored in Lake Istokpoga.

Discharge records of the past ten years allowed FCD to arrive at the amount of flow necessary to maintain a minimum flow into Okeechobee, he said.

According to the proposed regulations, the minimum level required to keep Istokpoga's adequate beneficial usage during May and June, is 37 feet mean sea level.

Proposed levels for the remainder of the year range from 37.3 in July to 39 feet in October. "If the level reaches 37 in May, there will be no further releases into the Indian Prairie system."

Among state legislators present; John Clark, Fred Jones, Lorenzo Walker, Ray Mattox asked the difference between present rules and the proposed changes in regard to results. Storch said there are no current minimum flow regulations and promised to let Mattox have the facts on results.

Storch went on to say that there is little surplus water in the Indian Prairie basin, making it necessary to

maintain a viable amount in Lake Istokpoga by keeping an adequate flow from Josephine and Arbuckle creeks.

Ted Delaney questioned the "regulating" of the two creeks and was told there would be no structural regulating, but rather a disallowance of further water withdrawals. Sam

Polston asked if that meant limiting pumping permits near the creek.

"Yes, we are setting a preliminary rule. From time to time it may have to be adjusted, but it is vitally important to maintain Istokpoga storage."



complete water management plan was instituted under the jurisdiction of the Spring Lake Improvement District, providing canals, pum ing stations and other facilities to provide drainage, while also conserving water within the district for urban industrial and recreational development.

"The concept of water control for the areas within the Spring Lake Improvement District lying north of Route 98. provides a system of canals and laterals that will drain by gravity to pumping stations, Ryan explained.

"For areas south of Route 98. drainage is provided by gravity through a system of interim lakes instead of finger



lakes, thus assuring there can be no pollution of Lake Istokpoga."

Throughout the system there are water control devices that will hold water service in canals close to the normal water elevation in order to conserve and attempt to recharge ground water from rainfall he said.

It may be many moons before the Arbuckle Creek sand bar is removed. The snag is the usual red tape and communications break-down between public and governmental agency.

Involved here is the Central and Southern Florida Flood Control District

In any case, the sand bar across the creek was formed by summer winds, but unlike Frank Sinatra's song, it didn't blow away again when autumn came. The severe blockage has taken the fun out of life for boating fans in Spring Lake subdivision and the funds out of life for Barnes Fishing Camp.

Spring Lake volunteered to remove the obstruction on its own, but a permit is needed from FCD. After the passage of time and letters, FCD engineers appeared on the scene to view the problem in person.

About a month later, calls were made again to the FCD main office. Finally...action! Action in the form of

reams of application forms and directions on how to apply for a permit to remove a sand bar.

Of special interest was the statement by an FDC engineer that "apparently the operation included redirecting the flow of water."

Now, it doesn't take an engineer to know that once a sand bar forms, water is automatically redirected, or the flow is stopped entirely. In removing the bar, water returne to its normal flow. The only th'redirection' is directing it homeward again, the way it was intended by Nature and not the FCD.

This fact may be a little difficult for the FCD to handle, but since the group has been messing about in the Everglades, redirecting all sorts of water-ways and swamps, draining in some places, flooding in others, sending the almost extinct Florida kite elsewhere, surely a little matter of a sand bar at Arbuckle Creek shouldn't be too much to swallow up.






The Festival of lights is expected to be even more impressive this year and should be a 'sight to behold'.

Not all builders are accepted into a HOW council. After volunteering to join they must go through strict screening and demonstrate their records of dealing, technical fair knowledge and financial stability. The national board then makes an objective determination of eligibility.

Craighill presented HOW



# Lightning sets fire in Spring Lake home

Florida Forest Service said the fire was reported at 3:55 p.m. Sept. 11. Rangers had to pull down ceilings in a fight to save the \$35,000 home.

Ranger Mike Sawyer said the lightning followed electrical wiring into the home's central air conditioning system and set off fire above the ceiling. He estimated cost of the blaze at \$5,000.

The house, a new one in Spring Lake Village II, is owned by John Fatan of Fort Lauderdale. Fatan had placed the house on the market and no one was living in it at the time of the fire.

On Sept. 7 Florida Forest Service rangers lost a fight to save a burning car. The car was on Arbuckle Creek Road, near the R. G. Johnson shop, but the forest service does not have a report on ownership. The car was demolished.


On Sept. 8 a brush fire broke out near Scotty's Auction Barn between Sebring and Avon Park, but the blaze was out before rangers arrived.



"It was difficult," said Betty, "but I loved it. What made it hard was all the apartments were identical, and yet the owners all wanted their homes to look different."

On the local level, Betty did the interior decorating for the Village I and II Spring Lake models. She also writes a monthly home decorating column for the Spring Lake Breeze.

Betty and her husband Chet, who is retired from the U.S. Army, moved in November of 1974 to their DeSoto City home, that was built by T. R. Carroll. Chet has worked painstakingly to bring a Polynesian formal garden effect to what was once wild scrub land.

In giving some home decorating tips, Betty said, "I've done some far out things you couldn't live in at the request of clients, but personally, I believe in comfort and convenience as well as beauty.

"If a person must have clutter, he or she should concentrate it in one spot. So many people have the whole house cluttered with items.

"Good pieces get lost in the midst of clutter. Many people don't realize it would look far better to show off one or two good pieces, and alternate what is on display. ## Value Of Spring Lake Soars

#### Tribune Bureau

SEBRING — The Spring Lake community, a modern housing development, has increased in value 434 per cent durig its five years of existence, records in the Highlands County tax assessor's office state.

The 3,500-acre development, about 8 miles south of here on U.S. 98 toward Okee-chobee, has an assessed value of \$7.6 million compared to \$175,000 five years ago.

Tax Assessor Billy Martin said 96 homes are contained in the acreage.

Don Stanick, Spring Lake controller, said the most recent evaluation includes 86 homes assessed at \$2,137,000 in village one oon the southside of U.S. 98 while 10 homes in village two, on the northside, are assessed at \$279,000.

The remainder of the evaluation pertains to property available for building.

Next year's evaluation will include a total of 157 homes as construction continues in both villages, Stanick said.

Meanwhile, Coral Ridge roperties Inc., a Subsidiary of Westinghouse Electric Corp., builders of Spring Lake, has announced the building of two additional villages, with models to be started later this month.

## **Anthropologists** dig Spring Lake

archaeologists has been done.

obtained.

"Exceptions are Goodnow and Skipper mound sites in Highlands County, which were excavated by archaeologists John Griffin and Hale Smith in the late 1940's. Their published study enables us to see how people were living in that area from about A.D. 1000 to historic times. They were able to point out that the inhabitants (during that period) were more closely related culturally to the people in the Glades than to the coastal people.

"Undoubtedly the area around Sebring was inhabited for thousands of years, yet we know nothing about them except what might be guessed by knowing what was going on in other areas of the state.

"We would like to excavate many sites to give us some

Dr. J. R. Williams, associate answers, but the expense, time and personnel to do so simply does not permit it. Besides we would also like to preserve these sites for future generations. In my area (Tampa Bay) most of the large sites and mounds have been destroyed, with the exception of one or two in public parks." Dr. Williams went on to relate intentions concerning the mound in Spring Lake.

Mrs. Clare Kryscuk taught sewing, which culminated in the creation of decorator pillows.



In the afternoons arts and crafts were taught by Mrs. Leslie Spooner and Mrs. Lois Amerman.



## Irrigation applications due after January 1st

Applications for irrigation permits for northwestern side of Highlands County — including Sebring and Avon Park — will be due sometime after Jan. 1, 1977.

Sam Polston, who heads Highlands Soil and Water Conservation District, said considerable confusion about application deadlines had arisen after a central Florida daily reported Dec. 31 would be the deadline.

"This is not true for the newly expanded area in the northwest corner of Highlands County. The northwest part of Highlands County includes six townships...roughly from Arbuckle Creek west to the Hardee County line and from Josephine Creek north to the Polk County line," Polston explained.

The rest of the county remains in the Southern Florida Flood Control District with headquarters at West Palm Beach. That district has been processing water use and drainage permits for about two years.

In line with changes approved by Florida voters, a new alinement of water districts will become effective Jan. 1 and that northwest section of this county will become part of the Southwest Florida Water Management District (usually referred to as Swiftmud.

Swiftmud headquarters is in Brooksville.

Polston explained that water permit requirements for this new area in Highlands County will be implemented sometime after January, according to Hildred Haight, supervisor of consumptive use permits, Brooksville. Haight may be contacted by telephone at 904-796-7211.

The small users, needing less than 100,000 gallons of water per day, and domestic users, will not be required to obtain a permit. However, "all people presently irrigating will be required to obtain a consumptive use permit, regardless of the source of water, be it lake, stream or well," Polston said.

He went on to explain that public hearings will be held after January and all the detailed information will be given as to the rules and regulations and the criteria for allocation of water.

"Many people have contacted the Highlands Soil and Water Conservation District office and the Soil Conservation Service in regard to when and how they should get a permit if their property is in the Swiftmud area. The Soil Conservation office has worked closely with many people in both irrigation and drainage problems that will be regulated under state law and water management district. At the appropriate time this office will be glad to assist to whatever extent necessary in supplying the information for filing for permits for projects with which help had been given, said Polston.

As Chippewa, who was paying the county \$21 a month for exclusive scavenging rights at the landfill, was the only bidder for the Avon Park dump, there will no longer be an Avon Park scavenger.

The DeSoto City scavenger also holds insurance with the same carrier, so it was assumed by the board that his contract will not be renewed when the present one expires.

In other matters, the commission:

- Heard that the cost of the new Highlands General Hospital parking lot would be \$7,200, and withheld action pending the hospital's participation.

- Approved a variance of drainage regulations for two developments which have all their lots fronting county maintained roads.

## Courts to consider Kissimmee

Cannelization of the Kissimmee River is a controversial topic which goes before a jury this week. Second District Court of Appeal has ordered Circuit court to seat a jury which will set the amount of money which should be paid to some landowners who, in 1971, filed suit against Central and Southern Florida Flood Control Dustrict.

The case is to open in circuit court here Thursday, Dec. 16, and is set down for two days in court.

The Deadwyler family, which has operated the Fishing Camp, at Lorida, filed suit in 1971 and has taken the lead in the long legal battle. Parallel suits were filed by Gordon S. Fletcher and Mary E. Carle.

Judge Clifton M. Kelly has presided throughout the circuit level proceedings and is scheduled to preside this week. At the initial hearing in the Deadwyler case, lawyers on both sides and the judge agreed that the suit concerns some

fundemental issues in Florida's attempts to deal with water control.

Judge Kelly, in 1969, had found in favor of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Lee, Mr. and Mrs. Robert P. Butts, in a similar suit against Central and Southern Flood Control (CSFC). Thomas Schwartz, who heads the SSFC legal team, later said his office had planned to appeal that decision but in the midst of other work missed the appeal deadline. He indicated, when the Deadwyler proceedings commenced, that he intended to fight this case "to the Supreme Court if necessary."

Judge Kelly ruled in favor of the plaintiffs in the Deadwyler suit. He said the cannalization made changes which amount to "inverse condemnation." He wrote, "The Kissimmee River no longer runs in front of the plaintiff's property but rather runs down the defendant's canal."

As time, and hearings,

passed Judge Kelly's written opinions became more barbed. In April 1974 he wrote, "The beautiful and historic Kissimmee River is now little more than a shallow lagoon."

He was critical of a dam "which diverted the flow of the river into a canal that reportedly could very well prove to be another government boundoggle undoing and redoing the

creations of nature."

In October 1975 the Second District Court of Appeal filled an opinion in the case and in May 1976 issued an order for a jury trial to settle the issue of damages.

Since the form of the trial here this week is that of a condemnation proceeding, the jury which hears the case will be a 12-person panel rather than the six which usually hears civil cases.

## FAA 'concessions' futile, says Cason

The "concessions" granted by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) at a recent meeting in Atlanta do not cast a rosy glow over Highlands skies according to Billy Cason, Sebring Airport Authority member who attended the

meeting.

On the contrary, said Cason, the socalled concessions do not change one aspect of the existing and planned Air Force Military Areas (MOA) boxing in Highlands County.

Cason told members of the authority that unlike many news media reports following the Atlanta hearing, they had definitely not been successful in their bid to have the MOAs charted over less populous areas, freeing county skies.

"The whole thing was cut and dried," Cason told them. "We got nowhere and now we're saddled with the MOAs. This will restrict general aviation in the area while the Air Force carries on dogfights and combat maneuvers over our heads.

Cason went on to say that "with this square about our heads we would never grow up to the potential of our master plan. We may not be hurt economically now, but certainly within 10 years."

He said that a state Department of Transportation representative had recommended a VOR installation in the vicinity of the Sebring Airport.

A VOR can be roughly described as an installation that permits instrument flying, and its use would create an airway over this part of Highlands County. Knowing that they could land under averse circumstances, a VOR

would encourage pilots to come to this area rather than avoid it.

Cason told the board that without a VOR "we would only be a line on the map." The drawback, he conceded, is that the FAA must approve a permit for a VOR and neither Cason nor the authority hold too much hope for their chances.

Cason reported that it would take three years for the FAA even to enter the \$100,000 project in its budget and the airport must prove it has the traffic to warrant one.

"We must have a trade-off with the FAA or the Air Force. We need senators and representatives to help us; we can't do it alone. You know the reason they wouldn't move the MOA farther east? There is a Piper Cub field and two airways at Vero Beach."

Cason said that there is one exception to the rule of FAA approval on a VOR. The Southern Regional Director of the FAA is empowered to approve the installation without going through the budgetary process, if enough pressure is applied by concerned legislators.

Cason urged that all Highlands' representatives in the federal government be contacted and asked to help the cause. The board agreed heartily and letters have been sent.

## John Greenwood bids for

All moved in by February and with production to start sometime in April. Those are the projected goals of John Greenwood, who is negotiating with the Sebring Airport Authority for a lease on the Kaufman and Broad building in the Industrial Park.

Greenwood appeared before the board Thursday to say that his plans have been stepped up, and that he wants to move his automotive operations to Sebring reasonably soon." He told members that he intends to bring one or two of his numerous corporations here at first, with more on the way next year.

According to the manufacturer-race promoter, he hopes to 'modify'' 1500 cars in the coming year, 500 of them in the K&B milding. The work force will be drawn from this area; some to remain with the operation, some to be trained and

sent elsewhere. He anticipates that he will need 100 people during the first year 20-30 in the initial six months.

At present the corporation modifies "used" cars, but in another year it will be manufacturing new cars, which, Greenwood said, they have already done on a limited basis. It took six months to build the tools with which to do so. Now they are receiving from 50-100 orders a day for modification and although the K&B building can only handle part of the work, it would "work out well," he said.

Greenwood said he has hired Bill Musselman, former Sebring Airport Director, to survey the K&B building and estimate the amount of repairs and remodeling necessary. However, he cannot wait until all the damages are put into order.

"I need to do something quick. I need it sealed security-

wise and leaky roofs repaired, but just fix up what we need to operate."

Authority members told him that estimated repairs had

beer put at \$17,000, but are probably inflated now.

With the building in question now part of a lawsuit for back rent, Greenwood asked if that would be an obstacle. Atty Michael Swaine told board members that according to the courts they have an obligation to mitigate damages, and that if they have an opportunity to rent the building they should do so. He said a judge would be inclined to look favorably upon that approach, rather than if they were hangeog in seeking full restitution.

We could release the K&B people from the remainder of their lease then sue for the difference. And we would be in a better situation to negotiate when they don't have to look at

an unending liability. We would be far ahead of the game, while helping out the local economy."

K&B's escrow account of \$35,000 would become the

property of the authority, he added.

Greenwood agreed to pick up the remainder of the fiveyear contract with Kaufman and Broad at the same rent, \$5.598 a month.

One of the "obstacles" he wanted clear, was that he would not make a personal financial statement in setting the lease. Instead, he volunteered to sign for the corporation, John Greenwood Sales, Inc. and to give a financial statement of the corporation, which has seven divisions.

Greenwood told the authority that the corporation has assets of a quarter million dollars in escrow in the bank and Please see GREENWOOD, p. 2

They're allowed to burn themselves out, usually lasting two or three hours.


In the first two years, the festival drew many visitors and Spring Lake officials anticipate hundreds of visitors this year from surrounding Highlands County communities and perhaps beyond.

## 'Democracy at work' says Batty of hearing

"Democracy in action" was how David Batty, representing the Environmental Council of Highlands County, termed last week's hearing on the Cross Florida Barge Canal.

Batty, an Avon Park Middle School teacher and ardent environmentalist, said that the hearing before Gov. Reubin Askew and his cabinet last Thursday and Friday in Tallahassee was, "an unforgettable experience."

Batty said that unlike the recent Air Force MOA hearing before the Federal Aviation Administration in Sebring, the barge canal hearing "provided a thrilling example of our Democratic processes at work, recognizing both individual citizens along with corporate executives."

Both copponents and proponents of the proposed watercoinse were given time to respond at the session,

including the Corps of Engineers, responsible for construction of the canal, and the Department of Natural Resourse, which advocated an end to any more construction on the structure.

Expert testimony from representatives of industry and specialists from universities, uncovered thought-provoking questions on the possible effects of the canal on Florida's economy, fresh water supply, ecological balance and natural beauty, said Batty.

The Highlands County man spoke briefly in opposition to the canal, presenting a number of petitions from concerned citizens who fear the destructive potential of such a state-slicing waterway, along with its doubtful economic benefit to the state.

Highlighting the hearing were appearances by past governors and congressmen and scientists, all contributing information pro or con the effects of a cross-Florida barge canal.

Batty said that Highlanders played a large part in the outcome of the hearing, which ended in a negative vote by governor and cabinet. The local man credits Don McClure, who collected hundreds of signatures from Highlands County residents, with a hand in that "Democracy at work" hearing.

## Airport FBO head up in the air over job

The new general manager and chief pilot for Sebring Aviation, the Sebring Airport's fixed-base operator, has accumulated a great deal of experience in her chosen profession.

Over the past 11 years, Sandi Pierce has spent a total of 4300 hours in the air at the controls of an airplane, and an additional 45 hours cutting through the heavens riding on the wing of a plane.

Said Sandi of her former wing-walking days, " 45 hours. That's a heck of a lot of time to spend outside a plane."

Sandi has been flying in air shows for the past eight years and still does, but stays inside the cockpit. "I still fly solo and dual aerobatics, but gave up the wing-walking after six vears of it."

She explained that aerobatics consists of performing a series of loops, rolls, and turns with a plane. Solo is with one plane, dual is in conjunction with another.

How did she become a wingwalker? "It was one of those crazy deals. My husband, who had been my flight instructor. always said he was going to have a female wing-walker. I laughed and said, "Oh, I can do

that." But then he didn't have the right plane. When he got the plane, he held me to my word."

As a result, Sandi has received a great deal of national television exposure, appearing on "To Tell the Truth", "What's My Line?" and even the "Mike Douglas Show."

"They 'got me' on 'To Tell the Truth'," said Sandi, "but not on 'What's My Line?'."

A flight instructor for nine of her 11 years of flying, Sandi will be the only instructor for Sebring Aviation. She said the same comprehensive program for obtaining a private pilot's license will be offered at the airport.

She presently holds several flight ratings, including a commercial license with instrument rating, multiengine instructor, advanced and instrument ground instructor, and even an airframe mechanic's license.

Although fairly new to her present position, Sandi has been living in the area for the past six years, moving into the county when her husband was working with the Fire Ant Eradication Project.

There are presently about 25

students actively seeking their pilot's license at the airport, and Sandi said thus far she has "been kept very busy."

As a woman in what most assume to be a 'man's" field, Sandi said she has encountered very little of the proverbial

vears.

"In fact, it may work the other way, because as a woman, the men are pulling for you to make it," she said. "Most students don't really care if you're a female, they

male chauvinism over the want to know if you can teach them to fly."

Sandi admits there are only a handful of female operators in the nation, but adds, "There are probably more than you would think."

For would-be aviators who wish to pursue a career in modern-day "barnstorming". Sandi said, "There are a great many careers available in aviation and aerobatics is only a very small part of it. But for those who do wish to get into aerobatics, I recommend coming out to the airport and signing up for a course in it."

And for any who may doubt her prowess, she'll be traveling to Perry the last weekend in January, to fly in an air-show.

by February with an eye on production by April. The date for moving here from Detroit, Mich., has since been changed to March.

At year's end the contract between Greenwood and the authority had not been signed, but the promoter called to say that his attorneys had found only minor points of disagreement. In the meantime he had made his commitment as promoter of the 1977 Sebring Race. His deposit on the controlling 126 shares of stock was made to the Central Florida Racing Association, a local group that had formed with the rallying cry, "Save the Race!"

Last year started badly for the authority. Ridge Security had gone out of business and the airport was left with inadequate protection. As a corporation, the authority was empowered to hire armed guards, so that solved the problem.

The board then had to face up to a snag in the airport sewer system, which developed a broken shaft that required manual turning. It had to be replaced, at considerably expense.

The annual panic about the Race took over, when it appeared that arrangements would not be made in time for the event. Greenwood had stepped in to promote the Race for the third time, bringing back Reggie Smith as coordinator.

At the last minute it seemed as if the Race would be called when Greenwood scheduled a rock concert and the authority demurred. The promoter bought out the contract of the rock group, and on March 20 it was off and running at Sebring. Greenwood, the popular favorite, developed trouble and was out of the race early. It was not the day for Corvettes, as Porsches swept the top positions.

Also in March Sebring Aviation, the airport's FBO was granted permission to set up a Sebring to Tampa communter run, but general apathy knocked it out of the skies. The board also curtailed the number of persons who could give flight instruction at the terminal, giving the nod to Sebring Aviation.

This remained unchanged later in the year when the airport-based Heron Industries was approved for the sale and chartering of planes. After a battle from Sebring Aviation, Heron was also permitted plane rentals. However, during the contest Chuck Allen, who ran the FBO was replaced with Sandi Pierce, well-known stunt flyer and instructor.

In August the faltering Sebring Vanguard Co., maker of the electric CitiCar, announced that it would suspend operations indefinitely. Although it has made sounds of recovery from time to time, as of now there is no activity around the smaller building to which the assembly line moved when fortunes declined.

One of the ongoing battles of the year was between the authority and Dutch VanInwagen, owner of Vanard Aircraft. When the board set a higher per foot cost on his building "Dutch" fought every foot of the way for a lower price. They finally reached an agreement, although the new lease is still not signed.

The track became popular for fly-ins and motorcycles races, albeit more programs were turned down than Other accepted. items considered during the year were the advisability of letting the Civil Air Patrol use an old Constellation as a clubhouse. going into the hangar business. whether to have a rental car at the FBO, the move of Heron into the vacated Charlotte Aircraft building.

Aside from the prospect of John Greenwood Industries, the biggest event of the year was the opening of the railroad spur connecting the industrial park to Seaboard Coast Line Railroad and points elsewhere. As an aid to cutting shipping charges for park industries, it

couldn't be beat.

However, when budget time came around the authority had to swallow a \$24,666 deficit, due to the cost of the spur and sewer plant repairs, uncompensated by rental from the K&B building.

Arrears on that ghostly edifice had reached \$133,731 this month, plus \$17,000 in damages.

The picture brightened when the expanding Florida Container, Florida's only manufacturer of plastic egg and hamburger cartons, achieved a \$210,000 grant from Farmers Home Administration that has provided a new building.

The year's biggest flap was the flapping of Air Force wings over the airport and most of this part of Central Florida. The FAA ( Federal Aviation Administration) revealed that it wanted to chart Military Operations Areas (MOAs) in four more chunks of Central Florida skies, effectively boxing in all of Highlands County with practice maneuver areas.

Charting such activities, with their varying altitude limitations, would strongly deter general aviation pilots from entering the area and would blight the economy knowledgeable people declared.

At a public hearing in Sebring it became quickly evident that the FAA had no intention of changing its plans, despite strong opposition from pilots, airport representatives and even some legislators.

At another meeting in Atlanta, attended by many from Highlands County, a few concessions were made, but these turned out to be virtually meaningless. The only hope for the Sebring Airport, most feel, is an installation that would create an MOA-free airway into the airport. Unfortunately, the FAA must approve such an installation and that federal agency is erecting stumbling blocks.

So into the new year the fight goes on.

# Airport Authority went through the alphabet

For the Sebring Airport Authority 1976 was like alphabet soup. The main letters were FAA (Federal Aviation Administration), FBO (fixed base operator), K&B (the costly, vacant Kaufman and Broad building) and JG (John Greenwood).

Because of JG, in December, the authority decided to modify its long-standing suit against K&B and rent the building to Greenwood, on the premise that a bird in the industria park is worth two in the courts More, the board recognized that the race promoters automanfuacturing business located there would be healthy for the community as well as the airport.

## Supreme Court upholds flexible boundaries for lakefront land

Lakefront property all over Florida may have some adjustments in boundary lines, as a result of a ruling handed down by the Florida Supreme Court.

The state's high court unanimously upheld Judge Clifton M. Kelly's ruling that the boundary for Lake Istokpoga is determined by the lake's "ordinary highwater line" rather than at the level which supposedly prevailed at the time Florida was admitted to the Union.

The Judge's order reached beyond Lake Istokpoga contentions— contained in a suit filed by Florida National Properties Inc., parent company for Spring lakes. The order declared unconstitutional a Florida state law which defined state controls over meandered fresh water lakes.

The Supreme Court opinion, written by Justice Joe Boyd, said, "An inflexible meander demarcation line would not comply with the spirit or letter of our Federal or State Constitutions nor meet present requirements of society."

Approximately 10 years ago Florida National Properties, a Westinghouse subsidiary, acquired a large block of land bordering Lake Istokpoga and began development of Spring Lake subdivision. In connection with this development the company sought state approval for "some work in the navigable waters of Lake Istokpoga . . . "

The trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund (the title for the Florida cabinet as it holds title to lake bottoms) and the developer became involved in a dispute over the location of the subdivision boundaries. The state claimed to a line located at a contour 41.6 feet above mean sea level while the developer claimed a line at an elevation of approximately 38.5 feet above mean sea level.

The argument dragged on for four years before Florida National Properties filed suit in early 1974. In its suit, the company said the line claimed by the state involved about 50 per cent of the land it had purchased for the Spring Lake development.

While they were not parties to the suit the issue has bearing on the boundaries for all property holders around the big lake. Subdivisions touching the lake include Itokpoga Shores, Sebring Park and the controversial Eagles Nest Estates.

Following a two-day trial in circuit court at Sebring, Judge Kelly's ruling, in favor of Florida National Properties, was appealed by the state. When Second

District Court of Appeal upheld Kelly's ruling, the case was taken into the Florida Supreme Court.

The state argued that "the ordinary level of the lake (Istokpoga) had been permanently and artificially lowered during the 1920's as a result of certain drainage operations conducted by property owners surrounding the lake."

Justice Boyd wrote, "The testimony clearly shows that survey notes made after the mean level of the lake was lowered, reflect that this lowering resulted in the exposure of only marshland, not of lake bottom.

Furthermore, the surveyor's notes continue to say that the lake is contained in a well-defined basin with an almost continuous shore rim which is timbered with good timber, mostly shore variety, giving positive proof of the location of the lakeshore before the drainage operations were put into effect. There was additional testimony that this timbered shore rim . . . is essentially the same today as at the time of the survey of 1928.

"The survey notes also indicate that the draining by the landowners approximately equaled the amount the lake had been raised by the hurricane (of 1926. . . . "

The "timbered shore rim" Justice Boyd referred to will be protected and preserved to the "very greatest extent possible," Jack Ryan, general manager of Spring Lake told The News this week.

Ryan said plats for Spring Lake Villages 8 and 10 have already been recorded and additional plats will be forthcoming. None of the land is now on the market and Ryan said a sale date has not been projected at this time.

Village 8 lies south of Village 1 and 10 lies to the east of Arbuckle Creek. Both are projected as single family residential areas, with about 90 per cent of the lots on waterfront.

Ryan said that in addition to lots directly on Lake Istokpoga the now undeveloped areas have two smaller lakes within their boundaries.

He said plans already in use designate portions of the Istokpoga shoreline as recreational area. All plans call for the trees along the shore to remain. Now that boundary line problem has been resolved, he said, designs for additional villages will be started.

Robin Gibson, Lake Wales attorney who represented Florida National Properties in the landmark case, told The News, "The Supreme Court opinion adopts the position we have taken all along. We were pleased to have Judge Kelly agree with us at the trial level and were more than happy to defend his final judgment in the Supreme Court."

The case was argued a year ago.

Gibson pointed out that the entire Supreme Court agreed with Judge Kelly's basic decision. Justices Arthur J. England Jr. and Joseph W. Hatchett wrote dissenting opinions which question whether Judge Kelly should have overturned all or only part of the state law on the lake boundaries.

Judge Kelly wrote, "... the Court can find no authority whatsoever for fixing the boundary line at a particular elevation as urged by the Trustees (of the Internal Improvement Fund) . . . "

He went on to say that the portion of the state law "which requires the Board of Trustees to establish the boundary line between the sovereignty bottom lands of navigable meandered fresh water lakes and riparian uplands, cannot be separated from the remaining portions of the statute . . ."

The Judge declared that without that portion of the statute the "other provisions of the statute are meaningless since they serve no purpose independent of the establishment of the boundary line. Hence, the statute, which contains no severability clause, is invalid in its entirety."

The Supreme Court opinion notes that some of the provisions of the overturned law are covered by "ancient common

law" and adds that if there is an "unlawful change in the high-water mark" the land uncovered by the lowering would continue to belong to the state.

The Supreme Court acknowledged that establishing a flexible meander line will not be without some problems, but concluded that an intlexible line is illegal and unworkable.

The far-reaching impact of the decision in the Florida National Properties case may be evident in light of the number of meandered fresh water lakes in the state. In Highlands County alone there are, according to Soil and Water Conservation records, 70 meandered lakes.

Sam Polston of the Soil Conservation staff said that as he recalls, Basket, Chilton and Olivia are the only ones of the larger lakes which are not meandered. The west side of Lake Letta is not, because the government surveyors were driven away by hostile Indians

Secretary of Commerce Ed Trombetta said the new development council will play a strong role in helping his agency promote business growth in Florida.







Saving graces

Editor

I would like to make a rebuttal to "F.Y.I." published in the April issue of the Spring Lake Breeze.

Yes, we do have problems with our canals in Lake Istokpoga Shores. The major problem is the periodic clogging by water hyacinths.

Funding for the control of aquatic weeds has been provided to the Corps, of Engineers and other agencies through public taxation, and hence should not require additional assessments. Everyone, including Spring Lake, would benefit if hyacinths were controlled in Lake Istokgoga proper.

As to drainage and improvement districts, the Spring Lake Breeze confesses

that they are set up to drain the land so that the developer can sell lots. The resulting home building and influx of people yields a tax base which makes the legislators very happy. The fact that the water table is continually being lowered, or that wildlife is being eradicated, or that the natural runoff of storm water is replaced by discharge into waterways is immaterial.

The developer of Lake Istokpoga Shores did leave us with something that is appreciated . . . the original grass bed located in the lake and just beyond our canals. These beds support turtles, ducks, frogs, ibis, herons, cranes, osprey, otters, egrets, hawks, ect..

The real problem is the preservation of all natural habitats, including Lake Istokpoga and its surroundings. This can be accomplished by first realizing that our mere presence has irreversibly damaged our enviornment and secondly by setting up a rigidly controlled no-growth plan which will prevent the further destruction of the environment.

# Lake proposals sunk

Not that the county commission has anything against the Highlands waterways, but of three requests put forth by the Highlands County Lake Protection Association one was rejected outright, one was tabled and was accepted, in a manner of speaking.

Carol Boley, president of the association, appeared before the board after the three requests were tabled a month ago for consideration.

Boley wanted signs, posted at all county boat ramps requesting owners to wash their boats after removing them from the lakes, to stem the spread of water hyacinths.

She also asked for a resolution submitted to the Department of Environmental Regulation requesting the commission be notified of any violations logged inside county limits, and a resolution supporting the association and its stand on the preservation of Arbuckle Creek, the last creek left in the county that is not ditched or diked.

Chairman Robert Skipper, who surfaced as the commission's chief opponent to the three requests, said he hoped to have the creek remain undiked, but was opposed to the resolution because it also calls for cattlemen to keep their cows away from the creek. "I can't agree with you on that."

Boley said the issue of the cows was a "small thing" compared to the ditching and diking.

Skipper reiterated that with the other provisions, including the ban on fertilization of the land in the vicinity of the creek, he could not support the association's position.

When a commissioner suggested that the group come back with a definite list of proposals, Boley said the commission has held a definite list for a month.

Mrs. Boley was asked if the proposals presented were indeed the result of the group's findings, not simply her own ideas, and she replied they were the consensus of the association's board of directors.

Earl Rich, clerk of the circuit court, said there should be copies of the association's meeting minutes available, since the state Board of Ethics may ask the county for them.

"Jug" Heston said that posting signs did not bother him, but Skipper said there would still be a substantial cost factor in erecting signs at approximately 35 county ramps.

"Besides, where are you getting the water to wash the boats down, from the same lake you just took the boat from, with all the seeds still in it?"

The sign posting was tabled until County Engineer Gordon Hays Jr. could come up with a cost estimate of erecting the notices, and the association could determine the exact wording of the message.

Commissioners agreed to ask DER for notice of violations in the county, because as "Buddy" Wise summed up, "I think we should know what's going on."

The issue of the Arbuckle Creek resolution remained unresolved, even after Ken Wilkinson made a motion to support the association.

County Attorney Robert Dunty asked Mrs. Boley, "Didn't you want to put a 'noman's land' around the creek, and found out from DER there is no legislation allowing anyone to do so?"

She read an excerpt from a letter from DER that said there was no such

legislation allowing it "at that time."

Wise stated he was all in favor of preserving Arbuckle Creek, but "but I will not vote for anything to prohibit a private property owner from using his land."

Skipper said that he felt "You could never get another water- shed project passed in this county," after the complications which arose after the Kissimmee River project.

Jack Ryan, general manager of Spring Lakes, told the board that in his opinion, "Mrs. Boley has a few misconceptions" about the governmental agencies involved with the county's water system, since "32 different agencies have control over Arbuckle and Lake Istokpoga."

Ryan cited a DER report that stated the biggest problems with Arbuckle Creek were drainage from the sewage systems of the City of Sebring and the air terminal.

Furthermore, said Ryan, he did not believe the proposals put forth by Mrs. Boley were genuinely documented since, "I talked with the vice-president of the association last night, and he said there has not been a meeting in so long, he can't remember when the last one was."

Mrs. Boley stated that the vicepresident was not on the board of directors.

Ryan said that his company, Coral Ridge Properties, owns the land on either side of Arbuckle Creek, and would be willing to sell it to the state or any other environmental group that has the money.

Skipper said he could not vote for the resolution, since it would mean the commission backed the association on whatever action it took.

The motion of Wilkinson was then brought to a vote and defeated.

# Area builders learn HOW

Over 100 persons including area builders, realtors and banking officials learned How Monday night, at a dinner hosted at the Kenilworth Lodge by Coral Ridge Properties, Spring Lake.

HOW stands for Home Owners Warranty Corp., which has now spread to 47 states with over 76 HOW councils

nationwide.

Jack Ryan, vice president of Coral Ridge and general manager of Spring Lake, explained that for HOW to be successful in Highlands County builders, realtors and others in allied professions must understand the program.

Highlands County HOW President Tom Dustin and Robert Seigle, Highlands County Builders Association president, spoke briefly about HOW before introducing David Lloyd. Lloyd, executive director of the Gold Coast HOW Council, gave a slide presentation outlining HOW and its advantages to both builder and home owner.

HOW is a 10-year protection plan that insures the owner against defects to his home.

Here's HOW: During the first year of construction the home is covered under a builders warranty against major structural defects. The second year, the builder also continues to bear the responsibility for replacement of unsatisfactory wiring, piping and duct work. If for any reason the builder cannot meet his obligation during those two vears, the national insurance coverage takes over to satisfy the complaint of the home owner.

During the remaining eight years HOW's national insurance plan protects against major structural defects. The cost is \$2 per thousand on the contract amount. Thus, a home costing \$40,000 would include in that price an \$80 HOW fee which is passed on to the consumer.

Dick Stephens, Florida HOW chairman, told the group that there are 8,532 homes in Florida covered under HOW, with 353 builders participating in the program. "Florida now

Builders went to Percy and asked that they be allowed to come up with an alternate plan.

After studying a similar plan in England the National Association of Home Builders began plans for HOW, which was launched in 1974. "Our main objectives," Stephens explained, "were to stop negative legislation, stop disreputable builders, promote ethical conduct among builders and upgrade housing across the nation."

HOW offers an arbitration plan if the builder and buyer cannot reach an agreement and is underwritten in Florida for insurance coverage relating to the plan by American Bankers Insurance Company of Florida.

"As a builder once said," stated Stephens, "HOW is not the question but the answer."

# New county board sits on zoning fracas



The new commission

At the reorganizational meeting of the Highlands County Commission Tuesday, three commissioners were installed by Judge Clifton Kelly. From the left: Cecil Skipper, who returns to the board after a

The recently-elected county commissioners had hardly been installed when they found themselves in the midst of their first controversy Tuesday.

First-timer Carl Arant Jr., re-elected Robert Skipper, and Cecil Skipper, back from a four-year hiatus, were sworn into their posts by Circuit Court Judge Clifton M. Kelly as the meeting's first order of business, and Norman "Jug" Heston and C. J. "Buddy" Wise were elected chairman and vice-chairman respectively.

The board then tackled a series of six zoning changes, two of which required a great deal of discussion before the final vote.

The biggest debate was over 4.49 acres on U.S. 27, near Lake Blue Esates in Lake Placid. The owners, E. and Frances Gissendanner, were seeking a change from unimproved acreage to B-2, general retail. a change hotly protested by residents of Lake Blue Estates.

The Zoning Board had approved the change by a 3-2 vote, after Gissendanner agreed to make certain concessions advantageous to area residents. Tuesday the commission learned that the residents still did not agree with the change.

A delegation from Lake Blue headed by O. J. Stevens, was present to hand commissioners a petition signed by 173 residents requesting rejection of the plan.

Stevens said Gissendanner was planning to sell the land to a firm that intended to put up a motel: "This would be an imposing structure," said Stevens, "and we think it would: cause environmental damage."

Stevens also maintained that a large business would create much more traffic congestion near that section of U.S. 27, which the residents termed already "hazardous."

"We just don't think he should be able to come in and build on top of our land which we have been developing for the past 14 years," said Stevens. "We do not think we can live with any type of B-2 0. construction ."

Joyce Shriner said that when she canvassed the subdivision with a protest petition, "Every person I talked to was totally opposed to this project." 1.1 ala

Among concessions are that a 100 foot strip along Highlands Ave. is to remain unimproved acreage, and that a six-foot wooden fence will be erected inside a 10-foot planter zone on the north side, the side fronting the subdivision.

Livingston said that although Gissendanner is not a legal resident of Lake Placid, he has maintained a vacation house in the area for years, and has owned the disputed property for seven years.

Stevens said they felt they could live with B-1 zoning, which would permit several small neighborhood shops, "But we'd like to see the plans first."

Carl Arant said that with the natural slope of the land, "I don't think very many Lake Blue residents could even see a three-story building there. Is a man to leave his property to just sit, or should he be allowed to put it to the best use?"

Marvin McPhate, of the Highlands County Builders' Association, said, "I know how all these people feel, but there is not a builder in his right mind who would put a house with 500 feet on U.S. 27, and then honestly expect to sell the house."

After Gissendanner agreed to install a separate entrance off 27 for the motel, Commissioner Robert Skipper moved to approve the change, saying, "When we zoned the county, we decided the area along 27 should be zoned commercial. With concessions, I see no reason why we should deny it."

The board voted unanimously to approve the change, and afterward Wise asked Stevens, "With all these concessions, don't you feel less animosity towards this project?"

Answered Stevens, "No."

In another zoning debate, Bossie Watson and other property owners in the Watson Heights subdivision fought for a zoning change from single family residential to multiple family residential. The zoning board had denied the request 6and a wife and daughter to think about."

Watson said he wanted to build duplexes in the area to provide more housing for the county's black population. Joe Masseline told commissioners the rooming house had been moved in without a permit, because he thought the mover was taking care of the legal arrangements. Masseline currently maintains the sevenbedroom structure as a single family house.

Arant said that when the change was brought before the zoning board, there was nobody present to argue for it. However, Murphy was there to argue against it, so the board had no choice but to deny the

Asked why they were not at the zoning board, Watson and Masseline said they had no knowledge of the meeting, and thought they only had to clear it through the commission.

Commissioners then voted to deny the change, telling Watson he could reapply in six months time.

In other zoning changes, seven acres west of the Bonnie Brae Mobile Home Park was changed from agricultural to mobile home park at the request of Daniel Bohland; four tracts on U.S. 98 across from Spring Lake Villages was changed to general retail and wholesale at the request of Aubrey Bone; George and Martha Tapley received a change to industrial use on 1.3 acres of land on U.S. 27 near the Agri-Civic Center; and the Bur-Mar Corp. was spurned in its quest to change the lot north of the "Yaca-Dome" on U.S. 27 from general retail to general retail and wholesale.

All except the Bur-Mar request, had been previously approved by the zoning board.



Mrs. Shriner also said sile was concerned about the proximity of the school bus stop to the area of future traffic congestion. "We would much prefer residential zoning. Mr. Gissendanner doesn't even live in Lake Placid."

Several other Lake Blue residents came forward to agree with all that had been said.

James Livingston, attorney representing the landowner, told commissioners, "basically, these people just don't want a business there. They want the area kept residential, but unfortunately, residential sections along the highway just do not go."

Livingston confirmed that the land was tentatively set as a motel site, but downplayed the traffic hazard. "Bus stops are not made to be permanent. It coule be relocated very easily."

Livingston continued, "As a member of your own zoning board said, a man should be entitled to the best use of his own property. I believe he has already made substantial concessions to the residents."

Leading the battle against the change was Elijah Murphy, who was scared the area would turn into labor camp if zoned for multiple family. "They moved in a rooming house, and under multiple family, they can put three men in a room. I've got a lot of money invested out there,

### **HOW has anniversary**

The Home Owners Warranty (HOW) program, now in its third year nationally, has surpassed the 100,000th mark in the number of new homes now enrolled in the 10-year buyer protection plan. Over 55,000 families now live in HOW homes while another 50,000 are now the market or under construction.

In Highlands County, where Warranty is less than a year old, 179 homes are entered in the HOW program, with 60 now housing their wellprotected occupants.

### Join the protest

All those wishing to protest the takeover of Highlands County skies by the U.S. Air Force, raise your hands.

Now that you have declared yourselves, form a line, close up ranks and march to the Sebring Civic Center Monday evening at 7.

At that time you will have an opportunity to hear a representative of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) explain why the proposed expansion of Air Force MOAs (Military Operations areas), cannot be moved eastward, where there are no growing counties nor airports to be affected.

There is, however, one commercial airline route over the eastern sector and Heaven forfend that an airline be disturbed! Better by far that Highlands and surrounding counties have their air space sharply restricted, in some areas as low as 500 feet.

That such limitations may mark the end of plans for air charter and air freight service, for air shows and fly-ins, for the progress of the Sebring Industrial Park and the advancement of all county airports, of free use of the skies by ranchers, crop dusters, commuting businessmen, sportsmen and general aviation, should not be considered. The airline is more important.

Actually, the Air Force is not the villain in this instance. A spokesman told the Sebring Airport Authority that the Air Force would be just as happy with its proposed MOAs to the east, but the FAA is not interested. With the same flexibility as the Florida Department of Transportation, the FAA is sticking to its guns.

However, as a sop, it will hear protests from the public. U. S. Rep. Skip Bafalis has promised to send a representative to help the underdog, but the rest depends upon public turnout and the amount of voice lent their cause.

# Industrial committee establishes priorities

"Everybody wants good clean industry" . . .

With that observation, members of the newly-formed Sebring Chamber of Commerce Industrial Committee set about adopting a list of priorities.

Recognizing the fact that this industry-seeking group will be in a very competitive market for the type of industry desired for the Sebring area, members discussed ways of determining "plus" factors that would encourage prospective clients to locate here rather than in other areas of the state.

"With the appointment of the Chamber Industrial Committee we are now in a position to take advantage of services offered by the Division of Economic Development of the State Department of Commerce," said Chamber President Gary McGehee. Scheduled to meet with the committee at the next meeting on Nov. 4 is J. Ed Bell, from the Winter Haven office of the Division of Economic Development, who

describe areas of assistance to the county available from the state.

Compiling the Economic Profile, a county industrial brochure, heads the list of "firsts" to be accomplished. A meeting with the Airport Authority and a tour of the Sebring Industrial Park, as well as other desirable industrial areas in the county will provide members with personal knowledge of sites available. A survey of incentives being offered by other counties, including the issuance of tax free bonds will be made, to determine the advisability of a realistic approach to place this area in a good competitive position.

Results of these studies by the committee along with recommendations will be presented to Sebring City Council and Highlands County Commissioners.

"Just as the State of Florida is now aggressively working to overcome the image as a anti business or no growth state, so must the communities who want to create job opportunities," said McGehee.

"Everything that we in our area can do to attain a favorable position is to our advantage as we strive to create needed job opportunities. We must extend a warm welcome to those clients we want to locate here and be adequately prepared to present the advantages of settling in our area."

Betty Neale, chamber executive director, said that following the publicity on naming an Industrial Committee, information on a number of commercial and industrial sites as well as data on existing buildings suitable for commercial and industrial location had been provided by local realtors. This adds to the rapidly expanding industrial file now being compiled by the chamber.

involved; that many of the MOAs have been in existence though uncharted, for years, some going back as far as World War II. Now, the FAA wants them charted.

Several men mentioned high-speed planes zooming low over Lake Jackson or shaking the trees near the Kenilworth. An Air Force lieuterant colonel advised those who had encountered dangerous flying to report to the nearest Air Force base.

His suggestion was greeted with hoots of derision, as many claimed that air base phones are not available to the public, or that they have received no satisfaction from calls. "What! All 800 lines?" asked one.

Harrison explained the types of training planned for each of the MOAs and the altitudes requested. He said that when the Air Force is not using it, the space will be relinquished to general aviation through the Miami control center. This statement too brought scoffing, some reporting that each area doesn't know what the other is doing and that previous reports have been found false.

Said Sam Dowell, manager of the Lake Wales Airport, "Hostility has been created because the military is not staying in its own area, but coming through our traffic patterns,"

A Lake Placid airport owner said it would be difficult for him to identify the numbers on a plane when it is coming through at 500 feet and 200 knots.

There were three distinct fields of protests from civilian pilots and-or persons with other interests.

Pilots felt that charting the MOAs would not restrict the military any more than present ones. ("All military traffic is a hazard to general aviation") and that the encroachment of the military is leaving very little "free" air space over Central Florida.

Local and vocal, were the cries of members of growing communities who see their progress potential snuffed out by the encircling military zones. A man from Panama City set the tone when he said an MOA has cost Panama City \$21 million annually.

Among many speaking for Highlands County were George Hensley, Ron Jestes and Billy Cason for the Airport Authorit, Billy Sebring for Sebring, Buddy Wise for the county and Jim Cook for the business community.

Each stressed that although local pilots could become used to the labyrinth of MOAs and altitudes set up by the Air Force, any non-local pilot would give the entire area a wide

berth. With much of the charm and a great deal of the convenience of Central Florida depending upon its air traffic, further restrictions would have a tremendous economic impact, they insisted.

The cry went up to move the MOAs eastward over sparsely populated areas without airports or hopes of immediate progress. Harrison wasn't interested, as a busy airline uses that corridor, he said, insisting that Vero Beach would be affected by an eastward move.

It was suggested that aerobatics operations be moved over water, but Harrison said that pilots become disoriented by the horizon line.

Billy Sebring, who said he does not fly a plane, was among those pushing for a move of the Lake Placid MOA eastward... "Who flies there, except mosquitos?"

"If you put this on the map it will kill us deader than hell and chase the pilots away."

Ron Jestes reported that the Air Force's Col. Phillips had told the authority that eastward would be fine with him and he had submitted just such a proposal, but the FAA had rejected it. The lieutenant colonel said he didn't know anything about that, but the Air Force likes their men to talk to groups.

George Hensley added that Col. Phillips had said that if the MOAs were not charted, the military would have to stop using those areas eventually. Harrison refused to discuss the matter and avoided other attempts to nail down that point.

Dennis Doyle, representing the Florida Aircraft Trades Association, said that contrary to claims of safety, a survey made by his group indicates that charted MOAs are the opposite of safe. They recommended against charting.

Only three voices were heard in favor of the charting. A man from Avon Park because he felt it would make flying safer, the manager of the Lake Wales Airport, a former Air Force flyer, and another man who proclaimed, "I want to know where the b.....s are!"

The stormy argument seesawed back and forth for several hours, while Harrison ignored a call for a vote from the audience, and finally became too hoarse to be heard past the first several rows.

The results were inconclusive, as the FAA man remained unmoved by the pleas and protestations. The public hearing was, in the words of many in the audience who walked away disgustedly, a farce.

# 200 angry citizens shot down by FAA

Some 200 angry, often shouting citizens tried to get their point across at a meeting with the FAA Monday night, but went down for the count before an implacable representative of the Federal Aviation Administration.

The meeting in the Sebring Civic Center was not long under way when it became apparent that hearing the public

was not the purpose of the public hearing.

The FAA was ostensibly seeking approval for charting Air Force Military Operations Areas (MOAs) on the nation's aviation maps. But it turned out that one such "proposal" had already been charted in September by the FAA and the hearing was little more than a formality.

Formality, and because the hue and cry of public displeasure had even reached the ivory control tower of the

Federal Aviation Administration.

In fact, Leon Harrison, representing the FAA Southern Region Air Space and Air Traffic Division, admitted that heavy opposition . . . 28 Central Florida objections and 21 inquiries from Congressmen . . . had prompted the meeting.

However, there was no meeting of the minds as Harrison stressed that charting MOAs is purely in the interests of safety, while persons from all over Florida protested the tightening web of Air Force MOAs and downgraded the infallibility of safety measures.

Even more vocal were residents of Central Florida, led by Highlands County officials clamoring, "You are killing us

economically . . . move it eastward!"

Harrison was not interested in the economic impact and eight Air Force members vigorously defended their operations.

The Highlands was represented by county

commissioners, Sebring city councilmen, Airport Authority members, Sebring Chamber of Commerce, airport owners and pilots, and numerous persons whose interests are in the growth of the county.

Also present were aides to congressional representatives, members of the state Department of Transportation, the Division of Forestry, Piper Aircraft Co., the Lake Wales airport manager, pilots from St. Lucie, Lakeland, Vero Beach, River Ranch, Miami, Panama City, Pensacola and more.

Presided over by Harrison, the "hearing" started with a slide of the proposed MOA areas flashed on the wall of the civic center. Many were not prepared for the sight of Highlands County so neatly boxed in by Air Force MOAs.

While the audience viewed the slide Harrison explained the FFA's "continuing effort to provide more service and safety, keeping high-speed, low-flying aircraft elsewhere. Even though it may, at times, be inconvenient or uneconomical the safety factor is well worth it."

He cited many recent incidents in which military and civilian aircraft had collided and blamed the lack of charted MOAs, which would make general aviation cautious in the designated areas.

Responses came quickly from the audience, and picking up speed and hostility as the evening went on. Many general aviation pilots described narrow brushes with Air Force planes which had flown under them, jeopardizing their safety. Some asserted that the Air Force does not keep to its own MOAs as it is, and by expanding them the spillover will be even more widespread.

# Commissioners name group to Pioneer Days committee

Perhaps it was the pre-election jitters, but something enabled the Highlands County Commissioners to quickly dispose of several noncontroversial items at a short Tuesday morning meeting.

The board appointed a five-man committee to investigate the possibility of holding the annual "Pioneer Days"

festival in Highlands County.

Last week, festival promoter Earl

Nickerson told the board the sponsoring group was considering moving the festival from its present Hardee County site, or holding two a year, with one outside Hardee County. The event consists mainly of an antique car show and a flea market for collectors.

Nickerson said last year, the festival drew 50,000 spectators and participants.

Commissioners agreed to delve into the possibility of holding the affair in Highlands County and Tuesday named Commissioner "Buddy" Wise as chairman of the investigating committee. Also appointed were Anna Belle Worden, of the Avon Park Chamber of Commerce; Gary McGehee, of the Sebring Chamber of Commerce; Mike Swaine, of the Sebring Airport Authority; and County Administrative Assistant Charles Cullens.

Commissioners set Nov. 30 as the hearing date for road closings proposed in the Ben. Hill Griffin property. Robert Padgett told the commission that most of the roads in question are "old-time trails, never used any more. The county does not maintain them and never has."

Padgett said the company has been having problems with vandalism

recently, and hoped the closing could help contain the damage.

The recently-formed Sebring Ridge Association presented the board with a petition signed by 44 Sebring Ridge residents, asking for upgrading of the subdivision's roads.

Spokesman Ricky Green said he realized nothing could be done this year as the road priorities have already been set, but sought the commission's consideration for next year. The board agreed to study the area's problems before setting next year's priority list.

Cullens read a letter from Jack Ryan, general manager of Coral Ridge Properties, offering to donate land for a proposed Lorida-Spring Lake area courthouse annex.

Chairman Robert Skipper said the board would certainly look into Ryan's offer, although the county is presently looking at another parcel of land as a possible site for the proposed annex.

Several weeks ago the commission discussed the possibility of a Lorida annex as part of the federal 'public works bill", designed to give local governments 100 per cent funding for

such projects.

In other business, the commission:

— Agreed to advertise for bids on several pieces of heavy equipment for the road and bridge department, and for a blinker installation at the intersection of SR 721 and SR 70 at Brighton.

— Agreed to house a number of cars, confiscated by the sheriff's department, at the Sebring road and bridge yard, until the cases involving the autos are cleared

 Agreed to name three streets in the Carva Hills subdivision, Regency Drive, Lancer Ave., and Cricket Ave.

— Agreed to apply for a federal "antirecession financial assistance" program designed to give funds to provide for the continuance of existing services that would have to be eliminated because of financial reasons.

## Supreme court says boundary rule stands

The Florida Supreme Court has refused to re-consider its ruling striking down a state law mandating fixed boundaries for the state's fresh water lakes.

All the justices upheld Circuit Judge Clifton M. Kelly's ruling that the boundaries of Lake Istokpoga are at high water line on an elevation of 38.5 feet above mean sea level. The state had claimed a high water mark at 41.6 feet.

Justices Joseph Hatchett and Arthur England held that it was not necessary to invalidate the whole of a state law which provided for fixed boundaries.

The suit against the state had been filed by Florida National Properties, parent company for Spring Lake Subdivision. Florida National Properties won each stage of the battle, begun in 1974. The Florida Supreme Court issued its

opinion in July, then, on Oct. 14, released the ruling that it will not re-consider the July position.

Florida National Properties officers have said the favorable court ruling frees the company to develop a large portion of its Spring Lake holdings. At one time the developer had contended that the old fixed boundary would result in the company losing use of approximately 50 per cent of the land it had purchased for the Spring Lake Subdivision.

# Sebring Chamber creates first industrial committee

Music to any area's ears these days is news of increased payrolls and an enlarged tax base created by new industry.

What's only talk for many may become reality for Sebring, as the Sebring Chamber of Commerce took a giant step toward more payrolls.

### Highlands Considers Car Show

"Buddy" Wise, who will serve as chairman; Charles Cullens, county administrative assistant; Mrs. Anna Belle Worden, executive manager of the Avon Park Chamber of Commerce; Gary McGehee, president of the Sebring Chamber of Commerce; and Michael Swaine, member of the Sebring Airport Authority.

Commissioners last week were asked by Earl Nickerson, a promoter of the Pioneer Days program in Hardee, to consider allowing a similar event here. Nickerson said some of the organizers had expressed interest in putting on two shows a


year over several days.

Skipper said yesterday he has not set a deadline for the committee to report back to the commission and added the committee would coordinate plans for any local show with promoters of the one in Hardee.

Also yesterday, commissioners read a letter from J. H. Ryan, assistant vice president of Coral Ridge Properties Inc., developer of the community of Spring Lake southeast of here, offering to donate land for a proposed courthouse annex serving the Spring Lake-Lorida area.

Skipper said before action is taken the county will look into other property that he said would be more suitably located. The county expects to apply for money from the new federal public works act

to build the annex.



# Ryan, commission rap overlapping regulations

Acting upon a recommendation put forth by a county developer, the Highlands County Commission has adopted a resolution asking the state to simplify land use controls.

Jack Ryan, general manager of Coral Ridge Properties, developers of the Spring Lake villages, told the board that he sent a letter to the governor and Highlands County's legislative delegation, seeking a moratorium on any new regulations that would further hamper the construction and real estate industries.

In speaking to the board, he said, "We, as responsible land developers, would like to have a consistent, easy-to-

understand set of rules by which to live."

Ryan said that all understood the need for environmental protection legislation, but wanted an end to the overlapping which confounded both private enterprise and other governmental agencies.

He cited approximately 35 areas of interest to those in the real estate trade that were discussed in the last session of the state legislature.

"The order that we, as developers, are calling for is not one of stopping or repealing all responsible legislation and land use controls, rather it is asking for the opportunity to sit down and put all the regulations from every level together, and map out the process so that it is understandable and there is an obtainable goal at the end of the permitting process, should the project be an asset to the area and state." he said.

He went on to say that when rules are altered, not only the builders who have to abide by the regulations are bewildered, it sometimes confused the regulating agency, causing delays in the processing of an application.

"The permitting agencies


are rarely put in a position where lack of action within a specified time period constitutes approval of the permit. Therefore, the only one who suffers by the inaction . . . of various agencies is the builder or developer whose application is being reviewed."

Ryan said the incident of the Department of Environmental Regulation refusing to grant the Central and South Florida Flood Control District a permit to clean out the mouth of Arbuckle Creek was a fine example of bureaucracies confounding each other.

Board members indicated they were in complete agreement with Ryan, and "Jug" Heston remarked, "For one tiny little bridge out here, we have to go through 32 different state agencies. And one of those is the Coast Guard."

The board adopted the resolution, also a resolution urging voters to support the proposed Amendment Seven, which would set up a board of elected officials to hear appeals stemming from the action of a state agency.

The Amendment will be on the election ballot in November.

### County ok's committee

An ad hoc citizens' recreation committee achieved official status Tuesday, when the Highlands County Commission appointed a seven-person group to study the feasibility of a county parks and recreation department.

Dr. Henry Mitchell presented the idea to the board of commissioners, saying that after conferring with Sebring City Council, "They felt that all things considered, there are many people who participate in existing programs who are from the county, and recreation would be best served by placing it on the county level."

Mitchell added that after conversations with the mayor of Avon Park and the city clerk of Lake Placid, they agreed with the Sebring council's feelings.

As a prerequisite step to the establishment of such a department, Mitchell said representatives from the State Department of Recreational Services told the committee Thursday that a study committee should be formed before the department is officially established.

He used Hernando County as an area which is basically comparable to Highlands in size and population, and which has just established a parks and recreation department.

designed to make money available for the acquisition of land and building, but none for salaries."

Mitchell said the cost estimates average about \$8 per capita on the national scale, but added that in some areas, particularly the south, costs can be as low as \$4 per capita, annually.

Mitchell emphasized the need for planning to help the county in its future development of parks and recreation and said, "At present, the county has no land around Lake Istokpoga, and in five or ten years there may not be any available. If we can get the state to help acquire land, we can develop it at a later date."

Chairman Robert Skipper was the most openly critical of giving the committee recognition, saying he felt it was "premature."

"If we authorize this committee, it will kind of be like our child," said Skipper, "and I feel like I should feed my child. I don't want to wind up feeding it to the tune of \$8 per capita. With our population, that's \$400,000."

Ken Wilkinson said he did not think the committee premature at all. "I would vote for the committee, but that does not mean I would vote money for it this year, maybe not next year. The state says we've never even applied for any of these available funds, and smaller counties than us have applied and received money to buy land.

"We haven't spent any money so far and we're not obligating ourselves to."

"Buddy" Wise said the board was "putting the cart before the horse."

"If we sanction this group, it might open a few doors for them. At this time, I am not prepared to vote for another department, but I am not opposed to sanctioning a committee to explore the possibilities of such a department."

Skipper maintained governmental departments always tend to snowball. "First they'll need a director, then they'll need a secretary. Then they'll have to have office space, tables and chairs, a car, the whole thing."

Dr. Mitchell replied that while a department may cost money, "They will also be performing a great deal of services. These people will be doing something."

From the audience Robert Rose, of Spring Lake, said he did not see the need for any more departments in the county, but Audrey Vickers, of Lorida, asked the board to "consider the people who would like to see a recreation department. We pay considerable taxes and do not feel we are getting adequate services."

Mrs. Vickers said the committee would be similar to the one which studied the countywide fire protection possibility, and whose recommendations were nixed by the commission in light of the cost.

Wise made a motion to approve the study committee and it passed unanimously.

Tentatively selected for the committee at the suggestion of Dr. Mitchell are himself and Mrs. Joe Macbeth from Sebring; Jim McWilliams and Harry Williams from Avon Park, Mrs. Edgar Stokes from Lorida, representing the rural sections, and Hosmer Compton and an as of yet unamed woman to represent Lake Placid.

### Corps wins 1, loses 1

The Army Corps of Engineers won a split decision at the Highlands County Commission meeting Tuesday.

In the first order of business, County Engineer Gordon Hays Jr. informed commissioners that the Corps had approached him about the possibility of setting up a full-time hyacinth spraying operation in Highlands County.

All the Corps requested was a fencedin space to park its vehicles and store chemicals, with no housing required. Hays told commissioners there is plenty of room at the Road and Bridge Department's yard at the Civic Center, and those gentlemen expressed great interest in having such an operation in their own back yard.

Constantly besieged with requests from citizens to petition the Corps for hyacinth spraying, "Jug" Heston summed up the feelings of the board when he said, "It'll be a lot easier to talk to them when we can look them in the

eye."

The board unanimously agreed to make all space possible available to the spraying group.

However, later in the meeting, commissioners were not on such fine terms with the Corps when they clashed with a representative who came to explain a recently-issued flood hazard report.

Ron Hilton, from the Corps of Engineers, explained that the report was issued after a study made to determine the practicality of diking portions of Lake Istokpoga's shoreline, a project some residents have found objectionable, primarily because it would severly limit the development of Istokpoga's shoreline.

Hilton said the study proved the idea to be "not practical and unjustified", and that the matter would be discussed further at a public hearing later this year.

However, Hilton said the Corps is required by law to make public copies of a flood hazard report when a situation such as this arises.

The report contains basic information about the lake and floods which have previously affected surrounding areas. Also, aerial survey maps are included, with the approximate boundaries of the extents of a projected "100-year flood". Such a flood is defined as a severe flood which can be expected to occur once every 100 years.

The problem arose when it was brought out that maps used by the Corps were taken in 1952, long before the heavy development of the Istokpoga area.

Hilton said the engineers designing the plan used topographical charts, and Please see CORPS, p. 2

figuring wind and wave action, just diagrammed everything under the elevation they figured as maximum. Consequently, just by looking at the map, it is impossible to tell whether a certain tract would be under eight feet of water, or one inch.

When County Attorney Robert Dunty told Hilton that his map differed considerably from the official federal flood insurance map, Hilton replied, "That is a preliminary flood map. It was prepared by a firm in Harrisburg, Pa., that never sent a man down to look at the lake." He added that the Flood Insurance people would be undertaking a more detailed study of Istokpoga later, probably next year.

Several engineers in the audience found fault with some of the statistics used in preparation of the plat, and Dunty said the issuing of an erroneous report "could be highly damaging to an established subdivision. Placing them in a flood plain makes them very susceptible to critcism."

Dunty said he knew that several million dollars were spent to make Westinghouse's Spring Lake ics likely to flood, by raising some of the property and building canals that would absorb part of a flood water overflow.

Although it was pointed out that numerous flood canals to drain off water have been installed, Hilton said, "Floods which have occurred in the past will occur again. We can let more water out of the lake, but every year more flood

damage is reported, because more and more people are building in flood-prone areas."

No actions was taken by the board, since Hilton was simply at the meeting to present the report. No action will be taken by the engineers as a result of the study.

# Betty Neale, 'doer', is now chamber chief

When the Sebring Chamber of Commerce appointed Betty Neale as new executive director, or directress in this case, they got themselves a fireball. Officially named last week, Mrs. Neale was told she could begin her duties on the first of the month.

# Industrial Land Woes Force Staff Layoffs At Coral Ridge Properties

By FRED E. FOGARTY Business Writer

Coral Ridge Properties, Inc., one of Broward's major developers, confirmed yesterday it was cutting back on its management staff at its Coral Springs headquarters and will devote more of resources to a new project at Naples.

Josph P. Taravella, chairman of the board and president, declined to disclose the number of employes that will be cut from the payroll.

Taravella said that while the sale of single-family home sites in the Coral Springs development have reached an all-time high, there is practically no demand for industrial and commercial sites.

"We're trying to operate as economically as possible and we don't want to be over-burdened with inventory especially on commercial and industrial sites," the Coral Ridge executive said.

Coral Ridge, a subsidiary of the Westinghouse Electric Corp., has operated profitably every year during its 20-year history. "And that's the way we intend to keep it," Taravella said.

In addition to extensive land holdings at Coral Springs, Coral Ridge also has developments on the Galt Ocean Mile, in Martin County and a 5,000-acre tract near Naples. Joseph Taravella



Taravella said the company expects to break ground on the Gulf Coast property this fall and so company financial resources will be channeled into the new project.

The Coral Ridge executive said the company has been steadily reducing its overhead, pointing out that in 1973 \$20 million was being committed to land development and road building while today it's less than \$1 million a year.

"Also, we don't see any major projects on the drawing boards mostly because of a reluctance by developers to get the numerous building approvals required by local and state agencies," Taravella said.

## Lakefront boundary ruling springs new court actions

A month ago the Florida supreme Court settled Spring Lake's property lines problems with its decision that fresh water lakes have flexible boundaries. Now two Lake Placid property owners are in court for an interpretation of the ruling.

Lewis E. and Erma R. Purvis of Arcadia and James E. Williams Jr., of Immokalee County, owners of adjoining parcels on Lake Placid, are involved in a dispute over extension of property lines toward the lake.

Purvis, an. Arcadia attorney, in a suit filed last week complained that during the week of July 12 Williams built a pier and boat dock

which encroaches upon the Purvis land.

Purvis contends that when a lake recedes the property owners whose land borders the lake receive rights to the land, apportioned according to the amount of lake frontage originally owned. His suit says that the upland property lines are to be ignored.

Purvis explains that his property originally had 92 feet of lake front and that in apportioning the land he should have "the right to maintain the same amount of lake frontage or proportional amount, in event of decrease or increase of the shore line."

Judge Clifton Kelly wrote the decision which established

the principle of flexible boundaries for fresh water lakes. Purvis, when he filed the new suit, sought to have Judge Kelly assigned to hear his case.

Kelly, who as chief judge of the 10th Circuit has the task of assigning judges, is currently hearing criminal cases filed in Highlands County and Judge John H. Dewell is handling civil cases.

A court staff member said Judge Kelly had declined to make a special assignment for the Purvis case but the Arcadia attorney had been assured that "all the circuit's very able judges are well acquainted with the Florida Supreme Court ruling in the Spring Lake case."

### The 'little red'

Shades of The Little Red Schoolhouse and that supposedly long-gone era! Gosh sakes Hannah, Lorida's got itself a kindergarten!

It is almost as if the wheel had come full circle since children migrated from rural one-room schoolhouses into the "normal schools" of the cities.

When that happened it was a low blow to many an old-timer, who would recall with questionable nostalgia the old wood stove that kept pupils only partially from freezing, flickering gas lamps, water that had to be pumped, outdoor sanitary facilities.

But on the other hand it gave him a fine opportunity to reminisce about how far he had to walk to school under conditions that would have fazed Superman. It was particularly entertaining to hear a couple of ex-country schoolies try to out-do each other. The miles kept getting longer, the snow deeper, and raids by hostile Indians more ferocious.

We once lost the admiration of a man by asking why he didn't slay the Indians with his frozen bologna sandwich.

And of course country kids didn't sleep. There wasn't time if they had to get up at 3 in the morning to start for school and did not get home until after 9 at night, only to begin their homework and barn chores.

Still, there were no more faithful alumni than those who attended rural schools.

Then, government-mandated standards of education became more demanding, more sweeping, taking in everything from teachers to materials, to curricula, to facilities. Economy too had its place in the scheme of things and school transportation systems made consolidation of far-flung teaching outposts possible.

One by one the gas lamps were extinguished and the doors of the little red schoolhouses closed. You can still see many of them today, used as the focal point of a well-designed residence, the schoolbell still hanging from the center gable.

Now it would appear that the trend was reversing itself, but only for the moment. At present many Highlands students are being bused a great distance within the vast boundaries of the county, a journey that is particularly hard on the younger ones.

Growth is not always predictable and when it does come, it is often patchwork style. With a burgeoning Spring Lake and a blossoming Lorida the children in that general neighborhood have been taking long daily trips to schools in Sebring. The school board's decision to open a kindergarten in Lorida will do much to ease the burden for the youngsters.

Even though it might seem a return to rural schooling on a minor scale, it is actually only a preliminary step. As that area continues its growth kindergarten will one day become an elementary school, and so on. Unless another Highlands community suddenly spurts ahead, the Spring Lake-Lorida area will undoubtedly be the fourth large division of the county school system.

So if those kindergartners are smart, they will start hoarding their Little Red Schoolhouse memories now . . . the ten-mile walk in the blazing sun, struggling to school in a hurricane carrying only a peanut butter and jelly sandwich, fighting off a band of hostile mosquitoes.

By the time they find themselves in a regular "city" school, it may be too late.

# U. Telephone breaks ground for exchange

United Telephone broke ground last Wednesday for construction of its new Spring Lake Exchange, scheduled to provide electronically-controlled switching service late next year for customers in a large area south of Sebring.

Local civic leaders joined company officials for an informal mid-day ceremony marking the start of the \$1.2 million, 4,500 square feet facility.

Edward P. Kittinger, company president, said the new exchange will serve an approximate 200 square mile area, from the Hardee County line east to Okeechobee County, bisected by U. S. 98. He said the project is needed to meet expected area growth needs.

The company's existing switching office in Sebring, said Kittinger, will be nearing its normal capacity of 9,600 customer lines by the time the Spring Lake Exchange is completed. The downtown facility on South Ridgewood Drive now serves more than 8,000 customers.

Charles Bryan, district commercial manager, said that Spring Lake Exchange's initial 1,400 customers will have certain optional services available to them following 'cutover' of its new equipment in December of next year.

'U-Touch' (push-button) dialing, he said, will be offered as well as 'call-forwarding' service. The latter permits one-party customers to have their calls automatically switched to other local numbers by dialing a short number code to the control computer. Another dialed code 'erases' the call-forwarding instruction when it is no longer desired.

One-party and two-party customers will also have a u t o m a t i c n u m b e r identification (A.N.I.) for direct dialed long distance calls, Bryan said. It eliminates the need for an operator to come on the line to identify the calling party's number.

The new exchange site is located approximately five miles east of U. S. 27 and just north of U. S. 98 in the Spring Lake subdivision, some two

miles south of the Sebring airport.

The one-story building, said Bryan, will be constructed with pre-cast exterior walls similar to the new Avon Park toll center. Architect for the project is William R. Frizzell, Inc. of Fort Myers. The general contractor is Don Leach, Inc. of Englewood.

Upon completion of the building next spring, equipment installation will begin, according to Bryan. It will be done by the manufacturer, North Electric Ohio, a Co. of Galion, subsidiary of United Telecommunications. Inc., parent company of the United Telephone System.

During the depredations of the ski mask bandits, rumors and false reports sent lawmen scurrying about the county. Even though they knew the marauders could not be in three different places at the same time, they had to check out all the stories for possible truth.

### State asks court rehearing in Istokpoga boundary suit

Florida's cabinet will make one more attempt to have state courts designate a fixed boundary for land bordering Lake Istokpoga.

Kenneth Oertel, acting as the cabinet's attorney in a suit with

Florida National Properties Inc., has filed a motion for rehearing before the Florida Supreme Court. In a landmark decision handed down July 14, the high court ruled that the boundaries of fresh water lakes are to be determined by the "ordinary high water line" rather than a fixed elevation.

Florida National Properties, parent company of Spring Lake subdivision on the shores of Istokpoga, had asked the court to settle ownership of land along the lake. The developer said the company held deeds for land down to the lake, when the lake is at 39.5 feet elevation.

The state said that under terms of Florida law, the elevation would have to be at the level which prevailed at the time Florida was admitted to the Union, or 41.6 feet. In a twoday trial before Circuit Judge Clifton M. Kelly, the state retreated somewhat and

claimed an elevation of 40 or 40.5 feet.

Judge Kelly ruled that the law setting a fixed meander line is unconstitutional. This opinion was upheld in appeals to the Second District Court of Appeal and the Florida Supreme Court.

In his motion for re-hearing Oertel is asking the Florida Supreme Court to designate the "ordinary high water mark" for Lake Istokpoga, and reiterates the claim to 40 to 40.5 feet.

J. H. Ryan, general manager for Spring Lake, said, "That puts us right back where we were; that line still takes our land."

Kenneth L. Connor, of the Gibson & Connor law firm which represents Florida National Properties, said he received notice of the petition Tuesday and is preparing a reply asking the court to dismiss the state's petition.



### Festival adds candle power

## Storm rakes Sebring

Was it a tornado? Was it a cyclone? It was superstorm!

At least that is the best way to describe violent winds that surged through the Sebring area Thursday, causing great damage.

Although no one reported a funnelshaped twister or the recognized swath of such a phenomenon its affects were similar, if on a smaller scale. Winds were estimated at 75 miles an hour accompanied by slashing rain and inky clouds.

More catch-as-catch-can than a tornado, the core of the storm skipped from area to area, upending trees, ripping off roofs, mangling TV antennae, breaking windows, catapulting signs from their stanchions, emptying swimming pools, and with its irresistible force moving immovable objects.

Ray Parker's car was moved from its carport on Lakeview Drive and sent skidding toward Lake Jackson. It took quick work and a bit of muscle to stop its

A large tree split in half as if by lightning and wound up on the roof the Dane Forst home. Harry Norris on Lakeview Drive ended with a yard full of

tree and an estimated damage bill of \$1,000.

Yet in some gardens the roses bloomed sweetly and unscathed in the wake of the storm.

Hardest hit were places of business along U.S. 27. The Top Value stamp redemption center lost its plate glass windows and gained more water than it needed or knew what to do with. Gifts on display near the window suffered the results of both elements.

A record amont of damage was tallied at Surplus City, where the storm vented all facets of its anger. Large signs came crashing down, the roof was shredded by the winds, and where there was no roof there was water . . . torrents of it in places, leaky pores in others.

The enormous stock of Surplus City was the principal victim and, with inventory still going on, the loss is estimated at \$35,000 while damage to the building itself is assessed at \$9,000. Movable signs which the company rents out, also bit the dust to the tune of about \$10,000.

The Spring Lake Shopping Plaza escaped severe damage when galvanized culverts which had been laying in the

open were tossed about like matchsticks and sent cascading toward the stores. Large garbage containers used by Dempsey Dumpster trucks were relieved of their burden, adding to that of neighboring householders.

under Spring Lake homes construction lost roofs, walls and, in one case the whole house, which was just awaiting a roof. Property owners lost utility sheds, screened porches, anything that wasn't tied down, and some that was.

Although most of the area escaped a utility blackout, a portion of southeast Sebring was without power for almost two hours when a transformer was damaged outside of Ace Hardware.

By Friday morning cleanup was already under way and large piles of debris by the curbside attested to the fury of the storm.

The whole episode was short, but unpleasant and although many in the county were calling it a tornado, others didn't care what it was called as long as it left them alone in the future.

In fact, some were calling the maverick by names not found in the dictionary under "storm."

# Thousands Of Customers Jam Sebring Store Opening

SEBRING — The economic recovery was evident in Highlands County as thousands of consumers jammed the newest department stores opening last weekend at the Southgate Shopping Center on U.S. 27 in Sebring.

Beall's Department Store opened last week in quarters formerly occupied by the now-bankrupt W. C. Grant Co.

AT THE SPRING Lakes Shopping Center, on U.S. 98, a women's dress shop — Anna Belle's — also marked its opening observance.

Meanwhile, plans were "moving along" for a scheduled shopping center on Kennilworth Boulevard adjacent to the Sebring City limits.

It will contain a K-Mart and possibly both an Eckerd's Drug Store and a Winn Dixie Supermarket.

PROSPECTIVE contractors have been in contact with the county building department on the project.

Meanwhile, county building totals for April will probably lag behind the record \$2 million figure tallied in March, Henry Eures, building inspector, said Friday.

Eures said there were two large projects started in April, a \$70,000 facility in the Mikell Industrial Park on South U.S. 27 to house tropical supplies, plumbing wholesalers, and a six-unit shopping center for construction in Lorida on U.S. 98. The Lorida project is owned by C. B. Jones Jr. and Tom Emmerson, builder, has estimated construction costs at \$64,000.

THE LORIDA shopping area will be on the site of the former Lorida Grocery, which was destroyed by fire in 1974.

County planning and zoning offices have received preliminary development plans on a residential project scheduled for the Old Williams Ranch on the Kissimmee River in the southeast area of the county.

That project, rumored to involve more than 1,100 lots will probably be referred to the Central Florida Regional Planning Council as a development of regional impact, a spokesman for the zoning department said.
